## THE NATIONS PREPARE. A NORTO STRUNG IN GEORGIA.

Great Britain Strengthening Her Colonies.

### FORTIFYING ESQUIMAULT

TWILL BE STRONGEST IN THE BRITISH EMPIRE.

Capable of Defending the Depot Against Any Force That Could be Brought Against it by Sea or Land - Present Dock May be Enlarged or a New Une Built - Hundreds of Men Working on Fortifications.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 23 —According to advices received in this city the English government is about to purchase ali the private property in the village of Esquimault, where is located the British naval station of its Pacific-American possessions. For many months past hundreds of men have been employed in constructing fortifications. but none save the most trusted officers o

the army and navy possess any details. What the general plan is, however, is common knowledge. It contemplates the equipment of a store, repair and supply station second to none in the empire, the bailding and manning of forts capable of defending the depot against any force that could be brought against it by sea or land; the providing of docks large enough to receive the largest ships, and the establishment of barracks, a service prison, and other necessary buildings for the use and benefit of the numerous soldiers and sailors who will be required to hold the forts and man the ships of the station.

Up to the building of the existing dock and for some little time afterward, it was not anticipated that any larger craft than the then best of her majesty's navy would require to be cared for on Esquimault blocks. Mr. Cutting states that on the occasion of the marriage he signed an agreement by which he declared he held for his daughter's benefit fifty bonds of the Maricopa and Phienix railroad company from the interest of which he agreed to pay his daughter \$2,-500 a year so long as she was the wife of Harold Courtney. The money was regularly paid up to May lat, 1893, when Courtney and his wife separated.

### RESTRICTION ON LOGS.

TORONTO, Aug. 22.—The most important

matter which came before the attention of

the legislature this evening was that relating to the action of the United States lumbermen, who are endeavoring to upset the legislation enacted by the province prohibiting the exportation of logs. In reply to a question by Mr. Whitney the attorney general intimated that the government have been fully aware of the efforts which have been made in this direction, and that they had taken prompt measures to protect the interests of the province. The negotiations have been carried on through the proper channels, but the correspondence is not of such nature that it can be brought down at present. The attorney general conveyed to the house an intimation that the gov ernment had taken a firm stand upon ite constitutional rights to pass the legislation, and further that the Quebec conference could only take the question up with the consent of the province. Mr. Matkeson took advantage of the motion to go into supply to offer for the edification of the house his views upon the financial position of the province, and succeeded in figuring out a larger deficit than he has been able to find upon any former occasion. He demanded that the government reduce its expenditure or increase its revenue by resorting to direct taxation.
