Spaniards Who Are Always

Against the Government.

OVERRUN, BUT NEVER CONQUERED

Rough Mountaineers Who Have Special Privileges and Tolerate No Interference. They Are Among the Stanchest Friends of Don Carlos.

The Basque provinces are a stronghold of Carlism and promise to make much trouble for the present rulers of Spain. The three provinces of Guipuzcoa, Vizcaya and Alava are autonomous, electing their own legislatures, their own governors, their own officials of every rank and grade except postmasters and being for all practical purposes absolutely independent of the Spanish government, save that by convention they contribute a certain amount to the Spanish revenues. The Vizcayans are not liable to military duty, save when their country is invaded. The conscrip-



tion is never enforced in the Basque provinces, and a Basque arrested for any crime no matter what, cannot be sent out of

Biscay for trial. These fueros have been a source of infinite annoyance to the government from the fact that the Vizenyans form thus an independent community in the kingdom and have privileges so exaggerated that the people of other provinces complain bitterly of the immunities enjoyed by the Basques. The latter, they say, are no better than themselves and should be placed on the same footing as the rest of Spain's people, both in regard to military duty and taxation. Every attempt, however, that has been made to abolish the fueros has resulted in a Basque insurrection, characterized by so much vigor that the government has finally been forced to yield

and purchase peace by renewing the fueros. Twice during the present century has the Spanish government endeavored to abolish the Basque privileges and place the people of these three turbulent provinces on the same basis as the other population. In 1912 the new Spanish constitution, adopted during the general reconstruction of Europe which followed the Napoleonic wars, graded the Basques as other Spaniards. Instantly the provinces rebelled. No taxes could be collected, the conscription could not be enforced, for all the Basques took to the mountains, and the war, begun in 1813, lasted until 1823, when the Basque privileges were restored and the Basques became quiet. Ten years later Isabella undertook to subdue the Basques, when another insurrection was started, and the Basques espoused the cause of Don Carlos. The government poured thousands of troops into the Basque country and seized all the fortified places. At one time there was not a town in all Biscay which was not in control of the Spanish troops. Seizing the towns and centers of population was a measureverpected to end the insurrection, but seemed only to add fuel to the flame, for in small parties the Basques operated in the moun tairs, and whenever the Spanish troops moved they fell into ambuscades, were fired upon by the guerrillas, and in 1840 the country was as far from being pacified as ever, when the government yielded the point and restored the privileges.

Again, in 1872, the government under took to subdue the Basques, when again they rose in insurrection, placing themselves under the leadership of Don Carlos. and the war lasted four years, resulting in the retirement of the pretender and the resumption by the Basques of their old rights. It was utterly impossible to subdue them. Their love of freedom and jealousy of any interference with their rights were so strongly marked that they had become part of the Basque nature. What they are now they have always been. Spain has been overrun by military conquest, The people of the Basque provinces are

but the Basques have never been subdued. the descendants of the aborigines of the country who were in possession when Spain was conquered by the Romans. Anciently ey were known as Vasconi, and a r c of this primeval name is found . . . caya, the people calling themselves Vizcayans. When the Romans conquered Spain, the aboriginal population retired to the mountains of the north and to the Pyrenees region, and there in fortresses rendered impregnable by nature they defled all efforts of the conquerors. The Romans finally concluded a convention with them similar to that which the Spanish government has been forced to make and utilized thousands of them in the Roman armies as auxiliaries. The Goths succeeded the Romans, but the Goths made no impression on the Basque coun-

try. The Moors and the Spaniards were no more able to overcome them than were the Goths. Like the Bretons in France, the Weish, the highland Scotch, they have been overrun, but never overcome.

The country of the Basques is peculiarly suited to guerrilla warfare, and officers who have conducted operations against them are unanimous in declaring that as guerrillas the Basques have no equals. While concentrated in the three provinces named so as to constitute the great majority of the population they are widely disseminated throughout the Pyrenees region, northern Spain and southern France. The whole of north Spain is mountainous. he Cantabrian range following the coast at a distance of 40 to 50 miles and breaking up near the sea into a number of branching chains, which cover several provinces. Thus from the Atlantic to the Mediterranean there runs an almost con-

tions. These mountains are the natural habitat of the Basques, and whenever an insurrection breaks out the inhabitants remove to the mountain fastnesses and can indefinitely prolong the war against any force brought to bear upon them.

As mercenary soldlers they were at one time as well known in Europe as the Swiss, their obstinacy, however, making them exceedingly intractable even under their own officers and wholly unmanageable under foreign control. Gonsalvo de Cordova had a body of them as mercenaries among his troops at Rome and said publiely that he would rather undertake to keep lions than Vizcayans. His experience was that of every commander who employed them, and consequently they fell into disfavor among the military men of Europe, and even 200 years ago only in the direst emergency would any government hire Vizcayans as mercenaries.

The Basques are mountaineers, and mountaineers in every country are independent, liberty loving and impatient of any form of political control save when exercised by their own people. Like the Swiss, the Welsh, the Albanians, the Afghans, the hill tribes of the Himalayas, they have never patiently submitted to a foreign yoke.

Proof Against Knives, but Susceptible to the Dart of Cupid.


