EXCURSIONISTS EXCITED.

THE CASPIAN LISTED WHEN NEAR GANANOQUE.

The Water Came In and People Grew Terrified-Life Preservers Were Donned, and Prayers Offered - "And The Bravest Beld His Breath For a Time "

On her way down to Ogdeneburg yester day, the R & O. steamer Caspian carried a very large crowd of excursionists. When nearing Gananeque a small yacht was mot, and as the boass saluted people rush ed toward one side of the Caspian to got a view of the other craft. The crowd was so large the boat listed, taking in water. It was some time before she regained her position and consternation reigned on board. Women turned white with fear and the men grasped life preservers and passed them around. These were quickly donned and the general im pression prevailed that everyone would have to make a fight for life in the watery element. A citizen, with the life preserver securely in place, signified his intention of jumping overboard and taking chunces of being rescued.

He was restrained from this action, however. For the time being "confusion worse contounded" prevailed and several were to be seen offering up a prayer for delivery. However, the steamer ultimately righted itself and on reaching Ganancque about 150 frightened individu als disembarked and took the train, or the steamer Hamilton in the evening, fr Kingston. A great many who had pur chased tickets for the boat in Gananoque were not permitted to go aboard, the boat having her full complement of passen gers. On reaching Brockville several hundred persons were likewise disappointed. Two full hours were given the excursionists in Ogdensburg. The Caspian reached Swift & Co's, what at 10:30 p.m. on the return trip. For many on board the little episode near Ganaucque marred the pleasure of the entire day's trip. But there was not the slightest danger. The Caspian is as staunch a boat as the country possesses, and a capsize would be impos able. But in a large crowd there is a large proportion of nervous women, and also a few excitable men, who make spectacles of themselves in a very silly way.
