SEEKING DAMAGES.

A Letter Said To Be Ready For Use From Au Official.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 30 .- A local newspaper declares that Fredrick Johnson, who was one of the first to reach Dawson when the big discovery of gold was made, bas, through the legal firm of Johnson & Burnett, entered an action against the dominion government for damages on the alleged ground that he has been "done out" of three mining claims through the action of the recording officials in Dawson City. The facts of the case are said to be as follows!

Johnston staked the three claims in different localities and then went to Dawson to record them. When he oppeared at the office he was told that the staff was busy just now but that he would be told next day whether or not the claims had been tecorded previously. At the same time the official, so Johnston alleges, asked him where the claims were. Johnston gave the desired information which the official made a pencil note of, remarking as he did so that he did not think the claims could be recorded. Johnston wanted to know why and the official inalleged to have replied that comething would have to be paid for the privilege. Johnston thereupon asked what he wanted and then requested the official to drop him a line next day stating the sum required. This the official did, and the letter which he wrote is now in Vancouver in the possession of Merers, Johnston and Bennett. In this letter the official said that for \$2,000 and a half interest in all the claims the claim would be recorded without further trouble. Johnston did not accede to the request, and so his claims were never recorded. A private tip, however, it is claimed, was given to a friend of the recorder and all the claims were recorded in his name.

WOMAN SURGEON FOR ARMY.
