



THRILLING EXPLOITS

Bravery and Heroism Brought Oul by the War.

Dandy never faltered. He put his forefoot into a pocket of stone and started The next foot was as carefully planted Two more strides and he was on the face of the cliff. Clarke leaned back as far as he could and talked reassuringly to his gallant steed. Dandy braced back on all four legs and slowly picked his way. The men on the crest of the cliff were afraid to cheer as they watched horse and man picking their way. They were afraid of startling the horse.

Down, down they went. From up on the heights horse and man looked like flies. Rocks rolled and slipped and crashed down to the plain below. But never once did Dandy lose his foothold and never once did Private Clarke lose his nerve. Inch by inch the two picked their way, though it looked as if the horse were standing on his head, and as if the man would fall over his head any moment. At last the daring pair reached the bottom. A mighty cheer went up.

Among the daring soldiers at the battle of Santiago was Richard N. Davidson, the crack sharpshooter of the United States army. He is remarkable for his soft brown eyes, which are very weak, upsetting all theories about eyesight in marksmanship.

Davidson enlisted in 1886. In 1800 be won a third class department bronze medal for marksmanship. His comrades guyed him, saying all his time would be occupied in burnishing his medal, whereupon Davidson replied that he would win a medal that would not need burnishing. And he did.

In 1891 he won the first gold medal in the team belonging to the department of the Platte. In 1892 he again carried off the first medal in the same department with a score that has never been beaten or even equaled since. This famous score was 680 points out of a possible 500. Later at Fort Sheridan, Chicago, he captured the first class gold medal for moving target practice, the object being at a distance of 800 yards and moving as fast as a man can move in ordinary walking, three miles an hour. In 1893 he was awarded the first "distinguished marksman" gold trophy, the Buffalo medal. This is the greatest honor possible to a marksman in the army. His score was 621 points out of a

These prizes were all won with a Springfield rifle. There has been no contest since the new Krag-Jorgensen rifle was introduced in 1894. However, Davidson is willing to try the new rifle in a contest with any marksman in the United States. William Terry, who is a gallant young

Noticing that a soldier was aiming a gun at her, she held up the child. Another flend in human form instantly put a pistol to the infant's head and killed It. Others came up and slashed the mother with their sa-Senada fled through a field of cane into

the forest. She afterward heard that the officer in command ordered quicklime to be put on the wounds of her sister. Aided by one of her father sold slaves, she reach ed a camp of insurgents. Maddened beyond all endurance and burning to avenge the death of her people, she rode with a column of Cubans in pursuit of the vandals. Never dreaming of danger, the Spaniards were leisurely plundering plantations and murdering women and chil dren when a column of insurgents gal loped down upon them, led by the beauti ful Senada. The cowards turned to fly, but it was too late. The terrible cry of "Cuba libre!" was resounding in their cars, mingled with the clash of the mathete. But one man escaped, the brutal officer who led the vandals. Senada rode in the thickest of the battle, where bullets rained, and cheered on her brave friends, A few days after this affair she reached the main army, where she found her brother. After consultation they concluded the safest place for the young girl was in the

"Yes." exclaimed Senada, "I shall stay with the army, and I shall rejoice in the first opportunity to show you that I know how to avenge the death of my father and

she did not have long to wait. When General Garcia met the enemy at the Pacheco plantation, Senada and her brother were with his column. "We are about to engage the enemy,"

said the young man, "and it is my desire, Senada, for you to remain with the reserves, out of the reach of bullets. You can show your patriotism by helping to care for the wounded."

The young girl made no reply. When the battle opened, she galloped among the troops wearing the coat of a lieutenant. White plumes were streaming from her hat and she was shouting "Cuba libre!" and brandishing a machete over her head. A wild cheer went up from the ranks, and as the line plunged forward the beautiful girl rode with them.

"No wonder we beat them," said an old battle scarred veteran. "Her presence was worth a regiment. In the thick of the battle Senada saw

the officer who had led the vandals against her father, and she rode at him with her lance, crying, "There is the murderer!" A young dragoon saved her from staining her hands in the brute's blood. She seemed to have borne a charmed life, for though her horse was shot from under her and comrades fell fast, not a ball touched her. As the enemy fled over the hills the Cubans cheered the brave girl. They called her their "little general," "the white rose of the army" and "the good angel of Cuba."

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.-The World has this cable from Manila : President Mc-Kinley wants admiral Dewey to go to Paris to advice the American members of the eace commission. He will forward by mail to Washington or to Paris a full report on the conditions here, with some recommendations, but he will not attend the peace commission's sittings personally unless he is specifically ordered by his government to do so. If peace should not be definitely agreed to, the admiral desires to be here for prompt future Gen. Merritt, however, will go to Paris

at the president's suggestion.

Still Potent For Mischief.

LONDON, Aug. 30 -The Times devotes an editorial to the discussion of the effects of war upon American commerce and trade. It thinks that the present hopefulness of the American people in this respect is not unreasonable and save that looking at the marvellous expansion of exports, the contraction of imports and the movement of American bonds homeward, there is irrefragable evidence of the country's growing wealth. The Times cautions English investors, however, to remember that the silver party in America is still potent for mischief.

Mountain Cl.mbers Lost,

BERNE, Switzerland, Aug. 30.-Dr. John Hopkinson, an English electrical engineer, and his son and two daughters have been killed, while accending the Dents de Vaulion, in the Canton of Vallais, the moun cains of which are among the highest in Europe and which are exposed to furious torrents and destructive avalanches. The party had gone on their perilous trip without the assistance of a guide. Dr. Hopkineon had intended starting for New York on September 28th, the trip to be made in connection with a synd cate which he was forming for the purpose of developing his inventions.

Japan Orders Boats.

Toronto, Aug. 30. - A special cable to the News says : The Japanese government has placed an order for five firetclass torpedos boats (Vipec type) with Meests. Varrow & Co., Poplar. The Viper, which is to be reproduced in the new Japanese destroyers, is building by Mesers. Parsons, and is a turbine propelled versel, the first to be constructed for war purposes. She is expected to steam thirtyeight knots, but her buildere have been given a free hand.

Scalded To Death While Bathing CHICAGO, Aug. 30.-H. T. Higgins, cashier of the treasurer's office of the Chi cago, Rock Island & l'acific railroad, is dead from burns received by the explosion of a vapor bathing apparatus, by which Mr. Higgins was endeavoring to secure relief from hay fever. In some unaccountable manner the machine exploded while Mr. Higgins was in it. The shock was terrific, covering Mr. Higgins with scalding steam and leaving scarcely a portion of his body unharmed.

Died From Speczing.

PORTLAND, Me., Aug. 30,-Miss Rachael Rosenfedt, New York, who was visiting friends here with her mother, has died from a violent fit of energing. She contracted a cold while out walking with her finance, William H. Pasco, an actor, and on her return home began energing. Al though medical aid was promptly summoned, the sacezing continued uninter ruptedly for several hours until a blood vessel burst and death ensued.

Has Excelled Himself.

BERLIN, Aug. 30. - The celebrated watch maker, Herr F. L. Lobner, of Berin, who has gained an European reputation by the invention of an apparatus for measuring time to the one hundredth part of a second, has again excelled himself, and has now perfected a mechanism for measuring and recording the one-thousandth part of a second.

PORT DALHOUSIE, Oat., Aug. 30 -A boxing contess took place last night in the music hall here under the management of the Phoenix athletic club, of Port Dalhousie, between Alexander Sloan, of East Saginaw, Mich., who recently defeated Kid Lalonde in two rounds, and Kid Gilbey of this place. Sloan knocked Gilbey out in three rounds.
