CAPT. KIMBALL'S SPEECHES CIAL STANDPOINT.

A Good Representation in the City Hall-Convincing Arguments Given-Truth Osacerning the Enforcing of the Prohibitory Law-The Evil Effects of the Licensing System Seen-dis Evening Address

Capt. Kimball. Being himself a native of New Hampshire and for many years a resident of Maine, he can speak with the certainty of experience of the success of the prohibitory liquor law there, and he avers that it is as well enforced as any law prohibiting crime can be. The city hall at 4 p.m. yesterday was, well filled to listen to the eminent divine, many ladies being among those present. John McIntyre, QC. occupied the chair, and on the platterm were Rava, S. Shibley, D. Laing, T. C. Brown, D. McCallum, J. Hammond and 8 Houston. The speaker dealt with prohibition from the financial standpoint, and in part be said

"Though I have been familiar with this country for a quarter of a century I would not presume to say that I am totally familiar with this subject. I represent matters as correctly as I am able; the instances that I give are many of them of personal knowledge. I deplore very much personal abuse in the discussion of this question. We share with the saloon-keep. er and his associates in the responsibility of the business. Therefore I am not, as a citizen, disposed to quarrel with my part. ner in business. I propose that we, from this moment, disolve partnership with the

"I admit with perfect frankness that there are two sides to this question. Influential men are opposed to prohibition. I do not say they are hypocrites or scoundrels. While we believe they are misled, we believe they are sincere. It would be better to sit down and argue than to accuse them. I want to set some facts before you. I wish to call attention to the business phases of the question, among them the destruction of property and its loss in value if prohibition carries. The principal value of the distillery is

From the first of Genesis to the last of Revelations, wherever God dwelt with a moral wrong, he says, "Thou shalt not !" The opinion of the world has reached the concensus that the liquor traffic is a gigantic evil. Prohibition does prohibit. That class of legislation directed against human appetites is always hard to enforce. Will any business man say the law concerning usury thoroughly prevents the crime? Are the laws against human passion perfectly enforced? No one will say they are. In most of the large communities in Maine strangers can buy liquor. But, as a business, the sale of the inebriating liquid is as much probibited in seven of the states as burglary or forgery are. It is, therefore, apparent that, while the enforcement of prohibitory laws is estisfactory, it is not perfort. No law that deals with criminality in Maine and Vermont is more strictly enforced than the law sgainst the liquor traffic. Young and respectable men have been seen in great numbers in our cities, towns and villages envering saloons and buying drinks, as they can under our license system. If a prohibitory law were passed would they sneak like a thief into a dog hole to buy a glass of liquor? No, they are too respectable for that.

The liquor law can be and is enforced. In dealing with vice, moral sussion can be but partially effective. Running along, side by side, is the law of God and His pleading, tender persuasion. Prohibition, stern, legal prohibition, goes side by side with loving grace. It is simply, equarely and emphatically a slanderous lie to say The liquor seller realizes seventy five or one hundred per cent. profits on his business. Some hotel keepers say that God's holy day is their best day for the sale of liquor. The license law cannot be approximately enforced. The business, of necessity, makes criminals of the men engaged in it. A prohibition law should be passed, and there was no doubt the province of Ontarie would, on Sept. 29th, speak in favor of it, as she did four years ago.
