WHO IS JAMES COUPER?

Anxiety Felt for the Whereabouts of Mysteripus Ingividual.

A strange incident has arisen out of the case against fifty-three persons fined for obtaining liquor from Mrs. Kate Whelan, Inverary, unlicensed to sell the same. Defendants were naturally anxious to learn who had laid information against them and found that the summones bore the name of James Couper. Now the mystery to be solved is "Who is James Couper?" He is not a resident of the county, so say those who are supposed to know, who declare there is not man by that name within the county limits. The city directory does not contain any such name, and the persons interested would like very much to know where the individual could be found, for the satisfaction of knowing who he is. D. J. Walker, J.P., before whom information was laid, declares the man was a stranger to him, and that he could not identify him again. John Dawson, county license inspector, says he does not know the man and never before heard of him. The circumstances are certainly remark-

able and sufficient to arouse suspicion. Should to be discovered that it is a case of impersonation, that another party assumed the name of James Couper and swore to the information under that name, his punishment, if his identity is discovered, will be great, as under the statute the offence is considered a serious one.

It was placed alongside the track in standing position with one arm raised as though to signal the car. The Work Inaugurated - Rooms For Classes

Secured-A Need Of Help. An important meeting of the committee of the young women's christian association was held yesterday to take steps in connection with the new fields of work to be undertaken by the association. There were present, Mrs. R. Chown (in the chair), Mrs. Dr. Clarke, Mrs. Prof. Shortt, Mrs. A. T. Drummond, Miss Machar, Mrs. Strachan, Mrs. Prof. Dyde, Mrs. Dobbe, Mrs. Prof. De Kalb and Dr. Jennie Dren-

Mrs. Shortt reported that the building on Wellington street, a few doors east of Princess street, lately occupied by Dr. Begg, had been secured and that Miss Pingree, a graduate of the Boston school of domestic science, and a niece of gover nor Pingree, of the state of Michigan, has accompted the appointment of superintendent of the association, with a special view to the teaching of domestic science, which will include cooking, housewifery, dressmaking and sewing classes. She also reported that the committee hoped to have the work in running order by October 1st; the course to embrace classes for ladies and bheir children, for school girls, and for do mestic servants. The fee for some of the classes will be merely nominal.

The chairman added that the committee proposed to start mid-day luncheons, to have the rooms of the association open every evening, and to have weekly social and religious meetings under the superintendency of the committee.

Mrs. Clarke having offered the use o her grounds at Rockwood for the benefit of the association, it was arranged that a garden party, open to the public, should be held there next Saturday, the 17th just, at 3 p.m., admission to be ten cents.

It is inhabited by about 105,000 parsons of the Jakut and Lamat races. In a large sometimes terrible storms. During the cers. summer time the temperature occasionally rises to 86 deg. Fahr. in the shade, while it freezes at night. The latter part of the season is often marked by copious rains and extensive inundations. Vegetation is very scanty. There are practically no trees, only wide, open meadows. The people hunt fur bearing animals, fish, and raise cattle and reindeer. It requires about eight cows to support a family, four being milked in the summer and four in the winter. CONFERENCE CANNOT TOLER-ATEWORLDLY AMUSEMENTS.

for modification. W. T. R. Preston moved to strike out the words, "Liquor cannot be legalized without sin." Mr. Preston admitted the desirability of prohibition, but maintained that the license system was not sinful, because without it the liquor traffic would be legal anyway, and there would be free brade in alcohol. A warm debate follow-

WOMEN LEAD A RIOT.

One of Them Struck by a Man Who Narrowly Escaped a Mob.

BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 14 -Rioting in which women took a leading part caused intense excitement in the eastern part of the city Monday. It was the culmination of a long and peculiar fight between Dr. Charles Moore, a druggist, and the consolidated Traction street railway company. The latter has been trying to cut two feet off the corner of Dr. Moore's pavement to lay a curve. For a month the doctor, his wife or some friend of the family has occupied a seat day and night on the corner to prevent workmen making

The railway men resorted to force. A crowd of upward of a thousand people collected to watch developments. The railroad men tried to rope the contested corner and keep the crowd back. Mr. Moore cut the rope. The workmen again tried to put up the rope. A lot of women grabbed hold of it. The workmen pulled and

the women tugged. One big fellow jostled an excitable young matron. She slapped him on the cheek and he struck her a violent blow in the face. This blow frenzied the crowd. The police rushed for the man, as did also the crowd. "He etruck a woman; kill him!" were the shouts. The mob was on him before the police could jerk him away.
