40,000 WERE KILLED.

Priglitful storm that swept over the West Indies.

London, Sept. 15.—Advices were received here last night saying that a terrible hurricane swept over Barbados, on the Windward of the Lesser Antilles. Two hundred persons have been killed and 40,000 rendered homeless.

St. Thomas, I., Sept. 15.—According to the latest reports from St. Thomas, the storm, which broke upon the island Sunday night, developed almost unprecedented violence, being accompanied by a tidal wave and tremendous rains.

Guadalupe, the French island in the West Indies, has escaped with very heavy weather. Numerous deaths are reported, and there have been destructive landslides.

The amount of property destroyed in St. Vincent cannot yet be estimated. Every small house is down and many large ones have been destroyed.

The American Out From Quebec With Lumber, then Down—Crew Saved.

Boston, Sept. 15.—The Norwegian ship America, Capt. Dahl, from Quebec for Greenock, Scotland, with a large cargo of lumber, was wrecked in mid-ocean by a hurricane on September 13.

By noon of the 14th she was waterlogged and a wreck. The crew, all of whom had long been taken to the rigging, set a signal of distress, and just before sunset the Marconi man in sight and discovered the signals.

A CRISIS IN FRANCE.

A Revision Will Be Unanimously Made in Dreyfus Case.

Paris, Sept. 15.—France is on the brink of the gravest crisis since the birth of the third republic. The situation is briefly this: Premier Buisson and all the members of the cabinet, with the exception of Zurlinden, minister for war, and possibly Lockroy are convinced of the absolute necessity of revision in the Dreyfus case in the interest alike of justice and of the state.

President Faure has caused it to be rumored that he will resign if it is granted. No one believes that he will resign. He has made himself the champion of the army and the chief, who will do anything to avoid the revision, that revision would entail, and they are ready to place that arbitrary power in his hands.
