Driver J. Burke, "A" field battery, died at l'Hotel Dieu this morning after a brief illness. He was removed from his home to the ho pital on Wednesday last suffering from acute rheumatism and dropsy, and despite the careful nursing provided death claimed him at five o'clock this morning. Driver Burke was born at St. John

N B, and his father was a member of the Canadian rifles. In his early life he assocated much with military men, which give him a desire for such a life. joined "B" battery as a driver and did active service during the north-west rebellion. At the close of the campaign he took his discharge from the battery, and in July. 1886, he came to the city and enlisted in one of the companies on duty at Fort Henry under Capts. Skinner and Murray. In September, when the com panies were disbanded, he joined "A" battery, serving the prescribed three years. after which he re entered "B" battery, serv ing two years. Purchasing his discharge, he re enlisted in "A" battery on July 13th, 1892, in which he remained until his death. He was thirty three years of age, a man of strong physique, and possessed an exceptionally even temperament. He was considered one of the best drivers in the bat, tery, having a thorough knowledge of horses and harness.
