WOULD NOT SETTLE THE EGYP. TIAN QUESTION,

Says a Strong National Newspaper of Paris -The Possession of Fashods Would be of No Utility to France-The Object of the Expedition Said to be Geographical Not Political.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—It is reported in government circles that news has been received that the Egyptian flag is flying over Fashoda. The fact, however, has not yet been officially announced.

A deepatch to the Daily Graphic from Paris says that Sir E. J. Monson, the Bribish ambassador, in the course of an interview with M. Delcasse, minister of foreign affairs, casually referred to the reports that Major Marchand at the head of a French expedition was at Fashoda, on the Nile. M. Delcasse assured the ambassafor in the most friendly manner that the government was absolutely ignorant of Major Mar-chand's whereabouts. He added that if the expedition was in the neighborhood of the Nile its object was geographical rather than political, but he begged the ambasea dor not to regard this as an official communication in behalf of the government.

The correspondent recalls that M. Delcasse was minister of colonies when the Marchand expedition was equipped, and that he made a motion in the chamber of deputies that the sum of \$400,000 be appropriated for the expenses of the expedition. It is consequently presumable that he is aware of the objects of the expedi-

Paris, Sept. 22 -The Paris press generally helds the opinion that the settlement of the question of occupation of Fashoda ought to be brought about through diplomacy and not by force of

Le Clair says it is in a position to fully confirm the falsity of the report that major Marchand has been re-called

Lo Matin believes that the British roceived timely information of the occupation of Fasheda through secret sources. Le Gaulois does not believe that any trouble will grow out of the Fashoda affair, but feels certain that an amicable agreement will be reached.

At the cabinet council yesterday M. Del casee, minister of foreign affairs, explained the foreign situation and communicated to the council full information in regard to the mission of Major Marchand in Africa.

THE SECRET TERMS

That Were Made Between China And

Loxpoy, Sept. 22. -A despatch to the lobe from Hong Kong purports to give details of the secret convention signed at Pekin on March 27th. It appears that Hen Yeng Kiouoi of the Chinese foreign office thereby concluded an agreement ed Port Arthur and Ta-Lien-Wan, stipulating that only Russian and Chinese warships enter or dock at Port Arthur. Russia, it also appears, gets the exclusive use of the inner harbor, Ta-Lien-Wan, the sole administration t of the ceded territor. ies and a trace of land north of Ta-Lien-Wan is designated as a buffer belt. Miners are opposed to the Manchurian rail ways and are obstructing the Russians. They are well armed. The Russians have about 25,000 soldiers between New Chang and Port Arthur. They have landed over 160 new big guns at l'ort Arthur and are building up forts very quickly. They have about thirteen men of war between Port Arthur and Ta-Lien-Wan.

ONE BODY RECOVERED.

Cornwall Bridge Victim Found-Killed In a Runaway.

Cornwall, Ont., Sept. 22.—The body of Harry Davis, Pittsburg, Pa., one of the victime of the recent O. & N.Y. bridge disaster, was found to-day floating in the river about a mile below the scene of his death. The body was taken to Cornwall. and his mother, who lives in Pittsburg, was notified. He was a young man and painter by occupation. Two bodies are still to be accounted for.

P. Robilliard, aged twenty-three, a blacksmith, whose home is in Aronm we. left Mille Roches last evening to drive home. This was the last seen of him in his. His horse was caught running awry by a farmer near Avonmore, and this morning his body was found by the road side about three miles from Mille Roches. He had evidently been thrown from the rig and dragged some distance. Coroner Hamilton deemed an inquest unnecessary.

Marquis Cervera, the military governor of Marianano, has issued an order providing for the return of refugees from the city and reconcentradoes to their farms and fields, offering absolute protection to all those going back to their homes and lands. To this end he has arranged for three omnibuses to run twice a week from Mariano to different points in the vicinity, taking the families and baggage free of cost for those who wish to return to their home in the country. The civil government, besides issuing orders to the mayors of Cano and Bauta to co-operate with the mayor of Mariano, has to the same end set aside the sum of \$500, to be distributed among those families which return to labor on the farms. Advices from Matacase continue to report great distress and the spread of sickness, to remedy which, it is asserted, the city officials do absolutely

Disarming Of Mussulmans. CANDIL, Sept. 22 -About 1,600 fire arms have thus far been surrendered by the Mussulmans in response to the demand of the British admiral. The most creditable reports place the number of rifles in possession of the Museulmans at about 25,000, which is exclusive of 5,000 martinis, the property of the Turkish government. Much difficulty in compelling the surrender of all these arms is expected. Sir A. Bilott, the British consul, has visited the christian chiefe and informed them that Great Britain had undertaken the protection of the disarmed Mosleme and warned the chiefs that any attack on the Moslems would be regarded as an attack on the British. The chiefs promised to abstain from attaching the Moslema.
