Granite excursion to Montreal October Many Victims In a Pennsylvania Minc.

BY TRAVERSING LONG UNDER-GROUND PASSAGES.

Scenes of Grief and Herror-Wives and Children Frantic With Grief-Nineteen Miners Still Imprisoned in the Bowels of the Earth-Little Chance of Their

Rescue-Excitement is Intense. BROWNSVILLE, Pa., Sept. 24 - Fifty-four men were entombed in the Umpire mine of Snowden, Gould & Co., one fourth of a mile below Brownsville, by an explosion of gas yesterday morning. Two dead bodies have so far been taken out. The dead are James Hall and John Bennett.

Searching parties are making trantic efforts to reach the entombed miners, but their progress is slow and there is great danger of another explosion which might bury them also under tons of rock and applied for permission to see his client. earth.

at the time of the explosion, work having been begun for the day a short time previous. Of these, fifty eight were in entries Nos. 9 and 10. Four men, Jacobs, Davis, Whotsell and Walker, were near the mouth of the entries. The others were far in. When the explosion came these four men made a rush for the main heading, which they succeeded in reaching, though all were more or less injured. They finally crawled out to the open air. Of the fifty. eight men in entries Nos. 9 and 10, these are the only ones are known to be alive.

Intelligence of the disaster soon spread and crowds gathered around the mouth of the mine. Terrible scenes of grief and horror were present. Wives and children of the entombed men were frantic with grief, and their shrieks and wails were frightful to hear. Notwithstanding the great danger, rescuing parties are working bravely, but their efforts have so far been fruitless.

At one o'clock in the afternoon five more bodies were recovered and it was feared that none of those still entombed would be taken out alive. At 1:30 p.m. twentytown, having escaped by traversing a mile and a half of underground passages coming out at an opening near Lynn station, on the Red Stone branch of the Penneylvania railroad. This point is four miles from the opening of the mine on Monongobela river. Another body, that of Robert Davis, has been recovered, making eight dead. Mineteen miners are still un-

Now In America - Won The English Iwo-Mile Steeple Chase.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 24.—George W. Orton, Toronto, has just arrived at Pulladelphia after his victorious career on English tracks, which resulted in his annexing the two-mile steeple chare championship of England.

Upon reaching here Orton surprised his friends by the aunouncement of his marriage to Muse Edith Wavne Martin. The ceremony took place at Montreal on August 25:h, immediately after the champion's arrival from the other side. The noted steeple-chaser spoke modestly of his victory in England. He attributed his easy win mainly to his jumping abilities.
