ARE ENTOMBED ALIVE!

Many Victims In a Pennsylvania Mine.

SEVERAL HAVE ESCAPED

BY TRAVERSING LONG UNDERGROUND PASSAGES.

Scenes of Grief and Horror—Wives and Children Frantic With Grief—Nineteen Miners Still Imprisoned in the Bowels of the Earth—Little Chance of Their Rescue—Excitement in Ontario.

Immediately following the explosion of gas there was a second explosion of fire. There were 140 men in the mine at the time of the explosion, working having been begun for the day a short time previous.

At one o'clock in the afternoon five more were recovered and it was feared that none of those still entombed would be taken out alive.

The explosion is said to have been caused by the loosening of a large block of coal which opened a pocket of gas. The entry where the explosion occurred is located a mile and a half from the pit mouth.

Mayor Griffith, Wolland, had a narrow escape from death by an explosion of natural gas in his house.

Late despatches from Pekin say the emperor of China is in danger of his life from a strong conspiracy.

Mayor Van Wyck, New York, will be nominated by the democrats for the governorship of the state.

Dr. Duchesneau, warden of St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, seriously ill, has taken a turn for the better.

Hon. George N. Curran, viceroy of India, has been elevated to the peerage as baron Curran of Kedleston.

The steamer Humboldt arrived at Seattle today, twenty days from St. Michael's, with 230 passengers from Dawson.

Gen. Woodford will not return to Spain as minister of the United States, because his private interests demand that he shall stay at home.

While an old gentleman named Eborer Sims was testifying at a prayer meeting at Tusket, near Yarmouth, N.S., he dropped to his feet and expired immediately.

John Spasiek, Montgomery, Minn., while feeding hogs fell in a fit, striking his head on a nail, which penetrated the skull about two inches, causing his death. He was ninety-five years old.

The government of Nicaragua, by a decree signed by president Zelaya, has advanced about 100 per cent. the duties on nearly all articles imported into that country which were dutiable under the preceding tariff.

Gaudaur has wired Duran to match both against the Lynch brothers for \$2,000, the race to take place at Halifax. It is not likely the challenge will be accepted.

The Lynch brothers row Rogers and James Ten Eyck for the same amount.

Perry O. Synonds, a Stanford university, Cal., student, has been selected by the British museum to make a zoological collecting tour of South America, from Ecuador to the Straits of Magellan, and will leave on his mission September 25th.

On the Cunard line steamer Campania on Thursday, while en route to Europe, the American peace commissioners held an impromptu concert in aid of the women's charities. Senator Frye was president, and many happy inferences to Anglo-American interests and good feelings were indulged in.

Charles Stockman, Baltimore, Md., came home unexpectedly the other evening, found his doors locked and says he saw a man walk down stairs and pass out the back way. He charged his wife with infidelity. She took carbolic acid and was after two hours suffering dead. They were married three weeks ago.

Liverpool has started the idea of giving concerts in the courtyards of the worst quarters of the city. Musicians have volunteered and the people for whom the concerts are given have cleaned up and decorated the courts. The experiment has been initiated at Wolverton and will be soon in Manchester.

Rector [Alkwarth], the Jew barber, has come to grief financially. His cigar store in Berlin has been closed by the sheriff for non-payment of rent. The saloons run by his son-in-law in his name were sold out some time ago. He intends to start in business again at Friedberg, the chief town of the district that elected him to the rectorship.

Among the East Indian potentates at queen Wilhelmina's coronation was his royal highness the sultan of Ternate. He received the order of the Lion of Nassau when his full name was revealed. It is Tadju Mahal Bindjilillahnan Sradjudj Mulik Amaramdin Iskandar Munawarsudik Waharmaniallah Sjah Patra Ajschar Rasidhinkah Sadjidj.

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GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER.

Death Through An Employee's Neglect—Robbed Of \$2,000.

MONTREAL, Sept. 24.—Sometime this week the residence of Walter Kavanaugh, 951 Dorchester street, was broken into and over \$2,000 worth of goods were stolen. The family were absent in the country and the robbery was not detected until to-day.

The other day a child named Napoleon Lesotte was killed by a live wire which was hanging down in the street. Last night the coroner's jury returned a verdict of manslaughter against Edward McGarr, an employee of the Royal electric company, who had seen the live wire hanging but had failed to report it as headquarters.

The British warships Talbot and Indefatigable are announced to leave Quebec for this city on September 30th, arriving the same day. The Pallastio is not expected until October 5th.

Local military officers are arranging a social programme including probably ball for the visit of the naval officers.

Lord Seymour, commander of the imperial forces at Halifax, and Lieut.-Col. Wilkinson arrived in the city to-day with a large party on their way to the Pacific coast. They came up as far as Quebec as the guests of Sir John Fisher, on the battleship Renown.

Allan line S.S. Numidian, from Liverpool, passed Father Point inward at 7 a.m. on Saturday.

Locomotive Brotherhood.

TORONTO, Sept. 24.—At this morning's session to the Brotherhood of locomotive firemen's convention about \$4,000 in accounts were allowed. These were allowed for work and supplies in connection with the convention.

The board of grand trustees was elected as follows: A. H. Hawley, New York; Frederick Keeler, Houston, Texas; and Frank McMann, Grand Rapids.

The next place of meeting will be chosen this afternoon, and the delegates will leave for Niagara Falls, via the Grand Trunk railway, at eight o'clock on Sunday morning.

The Hiram Easton Bank.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—The tug boat Hiram Easton, belonging to Simon Easton, Marickville, is disabled and is resting on the bottom of the Rideau canal. Thursday she arrived at the Ottawa with a large in tow loaded with cordwood for Kingston. Next morning the crew found the hull full of water. Luckily the water is not deep, and the tug settled on the bottom without being entirely submerged. News on board know how the accident occurred but are of the opinion that a passing steamer struck her.

Plot To Murder The Emperor.

LONDON, Sept. 24.—A despatch to the Central News from Shanghai says that the report of the death of the emperor of China is not confirmed. It seems, however, that his life has been endangered. The laiton (governor) of Shanghai has offered a reward of £2,000 for the capture of Kung Ku Jo, the leader of the reform party, who is accused of being the leader of a plot to murder the emperor.

Robbers Held Up A Train.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 24.—The Colorado & Colorado express train, on the Missouri Pacific railway, which left here at 9:15 o'clock last night, was held up by robbers near Leoda. The robbers shattered the Pacific express company's car with dynamite. Officials of the express company say the car contained little treasure.

Election Protest Dismissed.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 24.—The election protest against John McLaughlin, conservative member for Stormont, was dismissed this morning at Osgoode hall. W. Saunders appeared for the respondent and R. A. Grant for the petitioner. The judges were justice Falconbridge and Street.

Died From Apoplexy.

GUELPH, Ont., Sept. 24.—Andrew Tulton, one of the partners of Tulton Bros., implement manufacturers, died very suddenly last night. Apoplexy was the cause of death.

At Stratford on Saturday Thomas Howard charged Miss Mary Hyde, whom he is engaged to marry, with the theft of \$214, which he gave her to deposit along with her own. The girl was committed for trial.
