

Bas Now In Its Kye. VANCOUMER, B. C., Oct. 1 -10 in a sotthed fact that there will be a general election in the province before the coming seasion of the legislature is far advanced. The Semlin government proposes to break loose from many recognized rules of political warfare. It will do no juggling to secure a majority in the house, not even to the extent of electing a speaker from the ranks of the enemy or from those who might offer as conditional supporters. The government will make no bid for any opposition or doubtful candidates' support. lt will select a speaker from its own avow ed following. By so doing it will be left in a minority of one in the house, and an appeal to the country will scon follow. The government invites the appeal, and the result, its supporters are confident, will justify fair and straightforward dealing in British Columbia politics.
