GOVERNOR CORBETT'S REPORT.

Just Ended. C. H. Corbett, governor of the county jail has prepared his annual report for submission to the provincial government in which the following statistics are includ-

Number of prisoners committed during year anding September 30th, 1898, 113 males, 14 females; prisoners committed under sixteen years of age, 4; over sixteen years of age, 123; committed for the first time, 120; second time, 7; number sentenced for any period by all courts, 98. There were sent to Central prison, 13; to Mercer reformatory for females, 6; to penitentiary, 3; to reformatory for boys, 1; to jail and there retained until expiration of sentence, 75. There were sentenced for a period of thirty days, 19; from thirty to sixty days, 40; for sixty days, 1; from two to three months, 6; from three months to four months, 6; from four months to five months, 2; from five months to six months, 6; from six months to nine months, 7;

from one to two years. 7; over three years, 3. There were forty-nine prisoners maintained by the government and seventyeight maintained by the municipalities.

The nationalities of the prisoners were Canadian, seventy one males, nine females; English, twenty one males; Irish, twelve males, two females; Scotch, six males; United States, three males, two females; other countries, one female.

### THE DRUG COMBINE BROKEN. PROPRIETARY MEDICINES TO BE

SOLD AT OPEN PRICES. Evans & Sons Will Not Sign the Agreement -Six Tough Young Men Are Sent Up For Seven Years Each - A Veterinary In-

spector in Court. MONTREAL, Oct. 4 -The combine of the drug trade on prices of proprietary medicines and patent articles will be abolished in Canada. Evane & Sone have decided they will not sign the agreement, and other firms have taken the same stand, as the entire retail drug trade wish these lines sold at "open market prices." With the rebate price system abolished, the retail druggist estimates that he will find himself upon even terms with the big de partmental stores and able to survive in

case the efforts of the tories to prove corrupt and irregular practices on the part of their opponents in the Kingston election have come to nothing.

The caustic comments of the trial judges on the wholesale character of the charges made in the petition will be heard with estisfaction by all sensible people. One of numerous charges was that the Ontario government had raised a fund of \$10,000 to corrupt the Kingston electorate and make Mr. Harty's election sure. This evidence was offered in support of it. The strange thing is why such a ridiculous charge should have been made. What was to be gained by it? - for it is unreasonable to suppose that the Kingston tory managers were crazy enough to believe that it would be substantiated. Well might chancellor Boyd remark, "It is a di graceful charge, and should never have been inserted," and judge Fergueon eav that "it seemed to be a case of professional rivalry as to who could construct the

In this Kingston case the petitioner or those who acted for him seem to have used their powers of imagination to an unusual d gree. But it is much the same with all election potitions. All the offences speci fied by the election ac are charged against the successful candidate or his agents, with the hope that when the time comes for the trial evidence will have been found to lend color to some of the charges. It is dishonest, of course; but it is hard to say how such dishonesty can be prevented unless it be in the old-fash oned way of fixing

#### Mr. Harty's klection Confirmed.

The protest against the return of Hon. William Harty, minister of public works, with its 287 charges of corruption, has been dismissed, and the result of the Kingston election is confirmed. But the charges were not made in good faith. When forced to deal in court with the item relatmade to do duty for advertising purposes for weeks, the counsel for the prosecution simply stated that they had no evidence to offer. In dismissing the charge chancellor Boyd said : "It should never have been put on the record. It is disgrac ful to do so if there is nothing to justify it." Using the courts for such a purpose is one of the worst features disclosed by the trial.
