A Majestic Profit. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5.—The Pullman car company is capitalized at \$36,000,000 and its earnings were thirteen per cent. A dividend of eight per cent. was paid, which in the aggregate amounted to \$2,880,000, leaving a surplus of \$1,770,850.44. The income from the surplus account of July 31st amounted to \$25,247,643.34. When it is considered that the company started with an original capitalization in 1867 of \$100,000, the enormous and unnatural profit of the company will readily be seen.

Without Friction. Has Been the Evacuation of Porto Rico by the Spanish. SAN JUAN, Oct. 5.—The American commissioners to arrange for the evacuation of Porto Rico have been eminently successful in their dealings with the Spanish commissioners and it is believed that within a week all the Spanish troops will have sailed for home. The mission has been accomplished without friction. The evacuation of Porto Rico is the almost unanimous opinion of the medical staff of the American army in Porto Rico that the condition of the volunteer force here necessitates their removal north. Sickness is increasing and has been increasing the past three weeks at an alarming rate. Over twenty-five per cent of the troops are now on the sick list. The worst feature of the situation is the steady increase in the number of typhoid cases, which to-day reaches over 400.

A VAST CORAL REEF. Fringing the Coast of Queensland—Lovely Gardens of the Sea. The great barrier reef which fringes the coast of Queensland north of Brisbane in the direction of Torres Straits must always rank among the wonders of the world. For 1,200 miles the coral animalcula have raised a solid protection against the rage of the ocean swell at a distance varying from twenty to 150 miles from the shore. The reef is comparatively safe and calm inner passage suitable for navigation by the largest steamers on their voyages north and east. Sundry channels penetrate the reef at intervals, and whole fleets of trading schooners are regularly engaged to make the intricate labyrinth of coral islets.

LONDON, Oct. 5.—The Lieben correspondent of the Daily Mail says: With a view of adopting a policy of extreme prudence in the colonies of Portugal, the government has issued a circular inviting the opinion of experts on the industries to be protected, and upon collateral questions.

Two Fortified. MONTREAL, N.B., Oct. 5.—At St. Charles, Kent county, Monday afternoon, Maturin Daigle's house caught fire from live coals that dropped from a cooking stove, and when a high wind was blowing, which spread the fire very rapidly. In the confusion Daigle's father, aged eighty-six, and a grandchild, aged four years, were burned to death.

As the beche de mer, or trepang, these marine animals constitute esteemed gastronomic dainties in the celestial mansions, the importance of the export trade to the government of Queensland being proved by statistics. Over a hundred vessels are engaged in the industry. The value of the prepared article is quoted from \$30 to \$150 per ton, according to its quality and kind, and good annual returns have exceeded \$30,000 for the beche de mer alone.

RAISED IN QUEBEC. Vessel Was Sunk More Than A Hundred Years Ago. QUEBEC, Oct. 5.—For two weeks a wrecking crew and divers have been at work trying to raise the hull of an old ship in the Quebec harbor, near the Queen's wharf. For generations strange stories have been told by the Quebec grandfathers about this old ship that many years ago was burned and sunk in the river. There appears to be nowhere any authentic report of the ship, but it has always been supposed that it was the old French frigate L. Polican, which was sunk there over 200 years ago. Yesterday a large part of the old hull, bottom side up, was brought to the surface and at low tide was towed to the beach, where curious crowds swarmed to see it. Only a part of the hull has been raised, but it is in a state of good preservation, the woodwork being as sound as the day it was built.

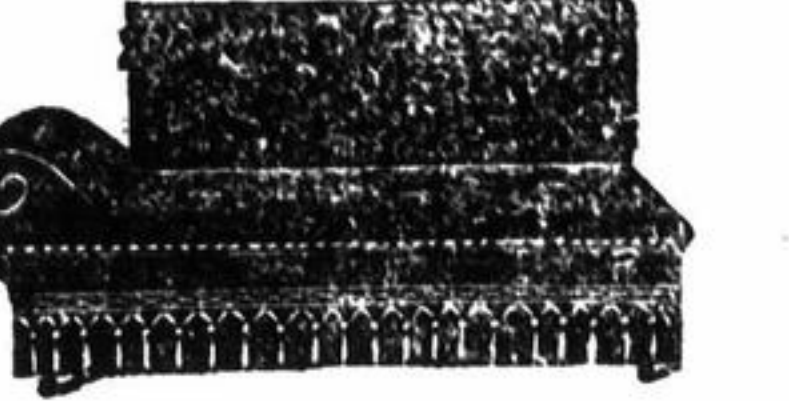
