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Had To Take Drastic Measures. SIX FRANCIS, Oct. 6.—Soldiers who returned from Honolulu on the steamer Senator state that drastic measures have been adopted there to enforce discipline. Foraging, it is said, had been carried on with a high hand. Gen. King policed Honolulu with 100 mounted men, and is said to have been caught for foraging would be court-martialed and shot. Everything has been quiet since the order was issued.

PILLORIED AT PEKIN.

Punished for Assaulting Europeans—British Trade Menaced. BERLIN, Oct. 6.—Prince Henry of Prussia has been appointed to command the squadron intended for the protection of German interests at Peking and elsewhere in China.

MANILA, Oct. 6.—The United States cruiser Boston and the gunboat Petrel, accompanied by the collier Neria, have gone to China.

PARIS, Oct. 6.—The Chinese legation here publishes an official communication formally denying all reports of the death of the emperor of China.

PEKIN, Oct. 6.—The Teung Li Yamen has amply apologized for the assault committed on October 1st on the wife of the Italian minister and several Americans. Several registers have been brought to the city to keep order.

The scene of the attack on Saturday was enclosed by ropes, and eight offenders were pilloried in the enclosure. They wore heavy wooden collars, on which were the inscriptions: "Punishment for assaulting Europeans."

Li Hung Chang has not yet returned to power and there is a division of opinion among officials as to whether he will be reinstated.

HIS DECREE COMMENDED.

Blanco Prohibits Confiscation of Cattle—Want Tariff Changes. HAVANA, Oct. 6.—Gen. Blanco's decree directing that confiscation of cattle on the island be stopped has been warmly commended on all sides, especially by tobacco planters, at present the chief sufferers, all the more so because the Spanish troops in the interior, despite the cessation of hostilities, are not enjoying the full blessings of peace, at least so far as food and nourishment go.

The tobacco merchants, planter, manufacturers and exporters are greatly excited and apprehensive over the new tariff which Washington proposes to apply. Committees representing the manufacturers and exporters have placed the matter fully before Robert F. Porter, the United States special commissioner, explaining wherein the proposed tariff would be a death blow to the tobacco industry of the island, and urging him to bring the question before McKinley, with a recommendation that the tariff be modified.

Gustav Back, representative of one of the largest tobacco syndicates on the island, has forwarded to McKinley a long and careful study of the problem. Luis Hartz, one of the foremost American tobacco merchants here, has been chosen by the various tobacco interests as a special delegate to proceed to Washington to urge a revision of the proposed tariff. He will leave to-day.
