A Long Interview With Kang-Yu-Wei.

IS FRIENDLY TO BRITAIN AND WESTERN IDEAS.

The Old Ruler Confided His Thoughts to the Cantonese Reformer and Appealed to Blu on Many Occasions-Auxious About Russian Encroachment and the Integrity of the Empire - The Restora tion of the Regency is Complete.

Lospos, Oct. 7.—The Hong Kong cor respondent of the Times telegraphs the substance of a long interview he has had with Kang-Yu-Wei. the Cantonese reformer, in which the latter recounted his history of the crisic. Kang-Yu-Wei said that an June 16th he had a two hours' audience with the emperor, who was anxious about the Russian encroachments and was ready to listen to any plan to secure the integrity of the empire. The Times correspondent

Kang advised replacing the conservative minieters by young progressives and the employment of Englishmen and Americans he emperor to study the progress of Japan and western methods. The em peror admitted to the cegency of his ful filments, but expressed his regret at being unable to remove high officials, be

cause of the empress dowager. Kang then urged his majesty to etrengthen his friendships with foreign powers and particularly to seek an alliance with England. The emperor said he realized that foreign countries were no longer insignificant states and ob served that it was a pity that ministers had not averted

the impending trouble. Kang says the real power at l'ekin is held by Li-Luen-Yan, a sham ennuch, and that the dowager's illegitimate son, Chun Ming, will probably be made emperor. On the morning of September 18th

Kang received two letters from the emperor, dated respectively, September 16th and 17th. The first represented the difficulties of his position, the empress downger's anger and his fears that he would be unable to protect his throne and commanded Kang to consult with his colleagues as to how to eave the emperor. In the second letter his majesty said: have commaened you to superintend the establishment of an official organ. It is fireman and engineer jumped and escaped strongly against my wish. I have with slight injuries. great sorrow which I cannot describe with ink and pen. You must proceed immediately outside to devise means to save me without a moment's delay." The letter concluded with an expression of gratitude for Kang's faithfulness, warning him to take care of himself and an expression of hope that matters would mend ere long. The Slater Shoe Concern Under the Labor
