#### QUEER PEOPLE IN TOCUPIA.

Race Of Glants Discovered By British Ex-

VANCOUVER, B. C., Och. 11. - Austra-Mohawk in the Samoa Islands, made public by an officer of the warship, who says:

"One of the most interesting features in connection with our cruise was the visit to Tocupia. This island is without hissubmerged continent, in so far that the formation is mountainous with valleys and has 800 people on it. They are gigantic in stature. One measured six feet ton inches, and the women are proportionately large. The men have long, straight hair, which they dye a flaxen color and which in thick folds hangs over their copper tintod shoulders. The women, on the contrary, have their hair cut short. They may be related to the Samoans or Maori, but they certainly differ so much from the Polynesian as to make their history most interesting. Strange to say, they have no weapons of defense at all."
