A NEWSPAPER MAN'S EXPERI-ENCE IN SANTIAGO.

The War Was Badly Managed-How Am munition Was Wasted - He Never Took Any Photographs Of The Fortifications At Sau Juan-Only 107 Reporters At

Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 12. - William reeman Halstead, special correspondent of the New York Herald, who was thrown into prison at San Juan by the Spanish authorities, accused of photographing the forbifications for the Americane, is here.

"This is where the funny part comes in," said Mr. Halstead this morning. never took any photographs at all. All The man Woodward, arrested in London | the photographs of the fortifications I had were purchased from a photographer there. They used me fairly well in the prison, because money will do anything with the Spanish. I used it liberally and was given a big room to myself, and received twelve cents a week for being imprisoned. All prisoners are paid, and those who work received \$1 50 a week. But I spent thirteen days of awful solitary confinement in a cell so dark that I could not see my hand before my face. The prisoners, as a rule, are treated terribly; once I saw five men killed by guards, their brains being beaten out. Still, in spite of all, it you get a Spaniard who is a gentleman, you find one to be relied on.

The bombardment of San Juan! Yes, saw it all. It was a terrible waste of ammunition. A shell struck the end of the building I was in, and, coming through, lit among a lot of Spaniards and mysolf. The Spaniards all ran to the cellar and hid. They were officers. The officers are cowards, but the men fight like devils. Sixty were killed by the bombardment.

"Speaking of the Maine," continued Mr. Halstead, "I had a strange experience then. Naval intelligence officer Jenkine urged me to take tea with him on the bag; sweet potaroes, 50c. a peck; Brussels Maine the night she was blown up. We often dined together. I accepted and was leaving my hotel to take a boat for the vessel when a boy tapped me on the shoulder and handed me a telegram from New York, in which I was ordered to do some work. I missed the boat and an hour later the Maine was at the bottom of the harbor and I never saw Jenkins again."

"About the war ! Why, it was badly managed. Gen. Shafter is a nice man, but he is so fat that he has almost to be carried around. He is too big to rnn away. The Cuban is easily satisfied if he has a few honors shown him, and I don't think the Americans will have any trouble in managing the people. There were 107 reporters at Santiago and of them only four were tie for duty as the climate is a killer. I have been in Cuba a year and

Mr. Halstead has seen Hobson often. He says when the Merrimac was sunk and the sailors with Hobson were rowing to shore the Spaniards rained all the shot at them they had, but as roon as they landed, shouting and cheering took the place of shot and shell and Hobson was treated by a lb. the Spaniards as a hero.
