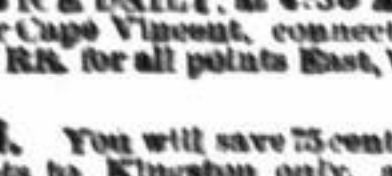

AMERICAN DEMANDS.

Wants Everything in Spanish Colonies Except Tobacco.

BADONA, France, Oct. 15.—According to advices received from Madrid a vigorous censorship has been revived there since yesterday. Senior Sagasta and his colleagues are said to be greatly concerned regarding the demands of the United States government, which they assert not only refuses to assume any of Spain's colonial debts, but wants to take the heavy artillery in Cuba and the floating docks recently sent to Havana. The same advices say that the Madrid Imperial announced that the government has cabled Capt. Gen. Blanco not to turn over any further territory to the Americans until the peace treaty has been definitely signed.

FORESTERS SUED.

On August 23rd last, Court Quinte, ancient Order of Foresters, Belleville, chartered the steamer Cambria to make a trip around lake Ontario, in consideration of a payment of \$200. Of this amount there is \$40 still unpaid, and suit has been entered against the Foresters and certain guarantors in Belleville to recover the amount. The members of the local court are prepared to fight the case. The owners of the Cambria, they allege, failed to keep their contract.

TORONTO, Oct. 15.—It is to be inferred from Gen. Hutton's outspoken remarks to the Queen's Own rifle, on parade, that a new policy is to be adopted in connection with the concentration in annual camps for training purposes, and that the general hereafter hopes to include a part, if not the whole, of the metropolitan battalions with the rural troops, not indeed for the whole period of annual training for which the rural battalions are called upon, but for one or two days, at the termination of their training, when it is understood that tactical instructions of an interesting and valuable character will form the main feature.
