THE CONTRACT SYSTEM

Versus Direct Employment Of Labor.

THE LONDON, ENGLAND COUNTY COUNCIL.

It Euseted the Magna Charta of Labor --Its Chief Items - Where the First Bints Originated - Hollding Done By the County Council Could Not Possibly Be Surpassed-Some Trouble in its Working At First.

The first London county council en teted what John Burns calls, "the Magna Charta of labor," The chief items of the charter are: (1) that all workmen employed by the council it self or by contractors doing work for the council shall be paid the rate of wages and work the number of hours recognized and in practise obtained by the trade unions concerned; (2) that unskilled workin in engaged by the council shall receive a minimum wage of 6d. (twelve cents) per hour. The second clause binds the council to pay a rather higher rate than even good outside employers (av., and was delitcrately fixed as the "moral minimum" below which it is impossible for a man to live decently and maintain his industrial efficiency in London. The first clause simply put the council in line with the common average of decent employers. The trace union rate of wages is, in every or, united trade, a well understood expression, denoting the actual rate which has been agreed to, more or less explicitly, by representative employers and the of the building trades, for instance, which include seven eighths of the work done for the council, the trade union rate has been solumnly agreed to in a formal treaty between the London building trades federation and the Landon master builders' association. The contractor who had fattened on the princely prices and "groups tree dom" allowed by the corrupt predeces sor of the council, soon showed a marked antipathy towards this reforming body that dared to dictate the conditions upon which its own work should be performed. Competition did not keep the tenders down to the lowest possible amount. The conneil began to suspect that the contractors were in league to take jobs. in turn instead of bidding against

The first hint came from the service f cleaning and watering the bridges over the Thames. The lowest "tender" of the contractors for deing this work always came out at 4s 71gd to 1s 101yd, (\$1.12 to \$1.17) per square yard of surface per anaum, whereas the bridge committee thought it could be done for considerably less by its own staff. With the unanimous consent of the council the experiment was tried and a saving of thirty-three per cent, has since been effected. No member of the council has so much as proposed that they should go back to the old system.

The next warning came from a build ing job, A small school house was to be erected at the council's great drainage outfall. The architect's estimate was f1.800 and tenders were invited in due course. Only three firms competed and the lowest tender was actually £500 or twenty eight per cent, above the architect's estimate. The main drainage committee felt that the contractors were trying to bleed the council. It asked leave to build the house with its own work men, and the case was so clear that not a single voice was rais d in the council against the proposal. Finaly, the total cost turned out to be 1536 below the "lowest tender."

But the case which has become classic, and which finally convinced three out of every four members of the council of the desirability of executing their own work, was an engin ering job, the York road sewer. became famous. The council determined to do the work itself, not a single voice being raised against the resolution, with the result that the work cost about what the engineer had calculated, and a net saving of \$1,177 was made, a compared with the lowest tender.

This remarkable result naturally created alarm and confusion in th contracting world, and attempts were made to impugn the engineer's figures. In his crushing reply he pointed out that the contractors had reckones out their tenders at absuidly high prices in nearly every detail. It seems probable that there was a general un derstanding among leading con tractors not to compete with one an other for this job, in order, by stand ing about to induce the council to a candon its fair wages cause. The someth preferred to attanden the con-

The outcome was the establishment in the spring of 1831, or a works department to execute works required by the other committees in precisely the same manner as a contractor. The works department stands as the other committees of the council exact! in the same relation as if it were an independent contractor When a committee has any work to execute the conneil's architect and engineer prepare the plans to make an estimate, without any reference to the works department. Then the council decides whether the work shall be done with or without a contractor. Sometimes it decides to put the work up to tender, a course which enables it to see whether the estimates of the architect and engineer are trustwor thy guides. The works department may say that it is not prepared to do the work, either because it is not sat is ded with the batimates and specifi cations, or because it has no conven ience for doing work of that partien lar sort. In that case the job is put up to tender and done by a contrac

The accounts of the works depart ment are kept distinct from those of other departments of the council. The finance committee sees that it is debited with the interest and sinking fund on all the capital it uses; that full allowance is made to cover depreciation and renewals; that a complete stock taking is regularly carried out by independent officers; and that all outgoing and maintenance charges are taking place in the linings of the nose and properly spread over the various works done. The accounts are elaborately checked by the council's con troller, as well as by the amiltor of the local government board to depart ment of the central government).

The workmen employed are engaged for each job by the responsible-foreman, exactly as contractor's men are engaged, under the general supervision of the manager. The members of the committee which control the work have always had absolutely nothing to do with the choice of men. "There is no foundation for the rumor," even the enemies of the department now admit, "that members of the committee procured the appointment of their relatives on the works," The council

has steadily set face against individual councillors even recommending men for employment. The rate of wages, hours of labor, and other conditions of employment are absolutely fixed by the council itself, as precisely those, neither more or less, formally agreed to by the London master builders' association and the London building trades (ederation and adopted by near ly every respectable builder in Lon-

Even its worst enemies are compelled to admit that the building done by the county council for itself could not possibly be surpassed. Under the contractor, scamping and jerry work are always present. It costs nearly as much to supervise him as to supervise the work direct. His profits depend partly upon getting inferior material and hurried workmanship rassed by the clerk of works. Thousands of pounds have been spent by the Lon don school board in rectifying blund ers and dishonest work done by its early centractors. But a public works department is under no such temptation. Material and workman ship under it are both of the best, Some progressives are of opinion that the quality of the work in London is quixotic in its beauty and thorough ness. Workmen's dwellings, for in stance, have been put up which will endure at least one hundred and fifty years and probably two hundred years, Long before that time, at the present rate of progress, a new method of scattering the population over wide areas will be adopted, and workmen will rightly refuse to live in tenement houses near the centre of the city, no matter how well they are 1 ilt nor how good the sanitation. But the gain on fire stations, sewers, asylums and parks within the next fifty years cannot fail to be large. Of reconstruction there will be none and of repairs very few. Time will more and more testify to the economy of good quality.

All this is accomplished without nibbling at wages or overdriving the workmen. At first there was inevit trade union executives. In the whole | ably a little trouble with some artisans who thought the conneil's ser vice was to be dreamland of rest. But the whole council, with the energetic assistance of the labor members qui kly dispelled that illusion. To unskilled laborers, a minimum wage is paid which is slightly higher than the market rate; to skilled artisans the trade union rate is given and the trade union conditions are observed, From all is expected as hearty and of ficient service as a private employer would demand. On dangerous work, such as the boring of the Blackwell tunnel, the council takes expensive precautions for the saving of life and limb and awards accident allowances beyond the custom even of good em plovers. Its permanent officials are well paid and have liberal holidays; foremen, managers, councillors, and ratepayers-all have reason to be sat

isfled with the undertaking. In Birmingham, Liverpool and Man chester the example of London has been followed with equally satisfac tory results. The superiority of dir ect municipal employment, under sal aried supervision, to the system of letting out works to contractors has in fact been slowly borne in on the best municipal authorities all over the country by their own administrative experience quite irrespective of social or political theories,

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The Globe publishes an interview which a correspondent had with Agoncillo, the representative of Aguinaldo, before the former left Hong Kong for San Francisco en hie way to Washing. ton and Paris to present the insurgent leader's views, it possible, before the United States peace commission at the French capital. Agoncillo in this inter view is quoted as declaring that the insurgents had a formal agreement with rearadmiral Dewey whereby absolute freedom was promised them in return for their asristance. When Agoncillo was asked if the agreement was in writing he said "No, we don't regard the United States as a grasping power and felt that a verbal agreement was quite sufficient."


