KINGSTON, Oct. 19.—Locally, merchants report trade as being fairly good so far this week, but the public market were below the average in attendance during the latter part of last week, owing to the cold, dreary condition of the weather.

Butter and Eggs—Fresh butter in prints sells at from 18c. to 22c. a pound, and in bulk and packed at from 16c. to 18c. a pound. Eggs are rather scarce being quoted at 18c. to 20c. a dozen.

Meat—Spring lambs, forequarters, 75c to \$1; hindquarters \$1.00 to \$1.25, or 12c to 15c per lb.; lamb, yearlings, quarters, 50c to 75c per lb.; chops, 12c per lb.; veal, 3c to 6c per lb.; mutton, foreparts, 6c to 7c per lb.; cuts, 10c to 12c per lb.; hind, forequarters, 3c to 4c per lb.; beef, forequarters, 6c to 7c per lb.; cuts, 5c to 12c per lb.; pork, 10c to 12c per lb.; hogs, 5c to 6c per lb.
