FIRE, WATER AND

BUSINESS TRANSACTED AT A MEETING YESTERDAY.

The Location of a Fire Alarm Box and an Arc Light - Lack of Funds For Such Purposes-Authority to Settle a Claim Given.

A regular meeting of the civic committee on fire, water and light was held in the city engineer's office yesterday after. Present : Chairman Minnes, alder men White, Elliott, Johns and Ryan.

On the petition of A. F. Campbell, asking for the erection of a fire alarm box at or near the corner of Albert and Union streets, chairman Minnes pointed out that the matter was brought before the committee last year by alderman Donnelly. A new box was erected this year at the corner of Wellington and Brock streets which cost \$90. The boxes were expensive affairs and the present condition of the finances would not allow of another box being erected this year.

Alderman White said that while a box might be necessary in that particular locality, still the dwellings thereabouts were isolated and there was not any fear of a serious conflagration.

Alderman Elliott thought the chief of the fire brigade should furnish the committee with a report on the need of boxes at certain points. Decision on the matter was, therefore, deferred for two weeks,

awaiting the chief's report. On the petition of Dr. Knight and others, asking for the erection of a new are light on Alice street, chairman Minnes pointed out that at the beginning of the year the mayor had drawn attention to the fact that yearly the number of lights were increasing.

Alderman White thought the matter very important. The petitioners were beavy tax payers and the need of a light in that locality was beyond question. Alderman Johns thought the request

would sanction the expenditure. The city engineer said the present committee would have to provide for only two months burning of the light, provided it

should be granted providing the council
