

BOARD OF HEALTH MEETS.

CONSIDERS THE HEALTH OF THE CITY.

A Sewer Needer In Nelson Street and Action Taken on the Petition Towards Granting Relief - Milk to be Tested Montaly if the Work is to be Done

A regular meeting of the board of health was held yesterday afternoon in the council chamber, there being present : Chairman Phelan, alderman Elliott, J. D. Thompson, Rev. W. B Carey, R. Mook, medical health officer Fee and sanitary inepector Gordon.

The minutes of the last two meetings were read and adopted. A potition was presented from William Bruce and leven other residents of Nolson street, asking for the construction of a tewer in that theroughfare. The potitioners have suffered for a number of years from the need of such a convenience, both as regards illhealth and inconvenience. If a rewer were built it would afford great relief It was moved by R Mock and seconded by J. D Thompson, that the complaint of W. Bruce and others regarding a drain in Nelson street, on sanitary grounds, be re-

ferred to the medical health officer and the city engineer, with instruction that they report to the board and so that if relief is necessary it may be granted without de-The mover pointed out than there were a number of residents on that thoroughfare and relief should be granted if possible. The city clerk replied that out of twenty recidents only twelve had signed the petition. Mr. Meek replied that there were already a number of complaints be-

the board and the other the city council. The chairman pointed out that the board could only recommend the construction of a drain where it was shown that a nuisance existed and a drain was absolutely needed in the safety of the health of the public.

Mr. Meek read the law governing the natter. Mr. Carey said that according to that it rested with the board to recommend to the council that a sewer be built. Mr. Meek's motion was adopted.

Sanitary inspector Gordon asked the city elerk if he had not received a copy of the quarterly report of the Outario health department. The clerk replied that he had not. Mr. Gordon intimated to the board that the report showed a vast increase in the number of deaths in the province from consumption, and he thought the board would do well to take examinee of the fact and take some action to prevent a -pread of the disease locally, as far as it was in the power of the board so to do.

Mr. Thompson thought it would be usoless to interfere, as persons afflicted with he disease would continue to marry. Mr. Gardon corrected the last speaker, saying that science had shown that consumption was not hereditary. Dr. Puelan substantiated this statement, saying, however, that marriage no doubt aided the spread of the disease through contagion.

Mr. Carey asked how often had the milk delivered throughout the city by vendors been inspected. Mr. Gordon replied that by him it had not been inspected since the spring, not since he had begun his assessment work, and it would not be inspected again until he had completed that wirk He added, however, that his test was fir butter fat only; it was not a test for purity. That would have to be defined by a

chemical analysis. Mr. Carev stated that it was brought out at the recent Ostawa convention that milk should be tested at least once a month.
