Big Order For Distilled Spirits

Chicago, Nov. 4.—The British govern-
ment has closed a contract here for the
immediate delivery of 125,000 gallons of
distilled spirits at Montreal. An Intima-
tion was given that about 450,000 gallons
would be all likelihood be ordered within
ten days. This order of 125,000 gallons
amounts to nearly 30,000 barrels and will
require over sixty cars for its transporta-
tion into Canada. The use of the distilled
spirits thus ordered will be in the manu-
facture of smokeless powder, of which dis-
tilled spirits are one of the ingredients.

surrendered to his workmen.

The extensive works of the National
starch company at Glenroye, L.I., were
almost totally destroyed by fire on Thurs-
day. The loss will amount to more than
\$100,000.

stronger than ever his "Kossoyian."
It is so forcible and frank that one is glad
the laureateship was not his, for then his
quaint-sounding status might have precluded
the publication of such masterpieces.

Parliament of the U. S.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—The Tribune says:

The Great Northern, it is reported, in-
tends to make application to the next session
of the Canadian parliament for a franchise
to extend the Spokane Falls and

the Cascades, the principal ports in the
West Indies subject to Great Britain.

It is also proposed to discharge a part of
the purchase of St. Thomas, a Danish
island, where hulks will be used. It
was reported yesterday, the paper says
further, that two British warships had
been ordered here to undergo slight re-
pairs, which, under ordinary circum-
stances, would have been made at other
Hawaiian islands.

Transporting War Materials

HALIFAX, Nov. 4.—The Furness liner

Halifax City, on Monday, had on board a
large quantity of war materials, shipped
by the department for transportation over
land to Esquimalt, B.C. They will be
sent from Halifax by expeditious freight
trains over the C.P.R. The Halifax City's
cargo includes projectiles, smokeless powder
and other explosives which have been
sent direct from English arsenals and fac-
tories. Repairs to the flagship Renown's
deck are still being made, but there is no
evidence of unwanted activity about the
big ship.
