ROUCEMONT'S PREDECESSOR

TOLD HIS QUESTIONERS THEY WERE LIARS.

Palmanazsar and His Alleged Travels in Formosa—Involved a Language, Writing It Backward Like Hebrew—It Was Correct in Its Syntax—Wrote a Confession.

"Louis de Rougemont," the fact Robinson Crusoe is still the talk of London, notwithstanding the fact that his preposterous swindle has been revealed and his identity as Henry Grin, a Swiss, fully established in the Daily Chronicle. Just now that Louis de Rougemont is a plain letters which are flowing in from all parts of the united kingdom purporting to come from former residents of Australia, who knew Mr. Grin out there, and who positively assert that the man calling himself Louis de Rougemont is altogether a different person. One letter comes from a writer signing himself "Thomas Singleton," and is dated at "Union Bar, Union street, Birmingham."

Some of the London papers are calling the career of a grotesque impostor even than "De Rougemont," one who was never successfully exposed. His name was George Palmanazsar, of whom Diarrell the elder wrote that he defied and baffled the most learned. Palmanazsar, who said he was a Formosan, Japanese, appeared in London in the early part of the last century under the protection of a crafty clergyman named Innes.

The latter, who attached his name to the title of a religious meditation, entitled, "Modest Inquiry After Moral Virtue" was soon discovered to be a forger and disappeared. Palmanazsar survived the shock and gain many believers. Formosa was the name of the alleged native from that island had the affrontory not only to invent an alphabet, which he asserted was Formosan, but a language as well.

The language he wrote backward like Hebrew, or some of the most learned grammarians of the day described as correct in syntax. In 1702 he brought out a translation, in what he alleged to be Formosan, of the English prayer book, and he collected subscriptions to send and ship to the books to the island in the Pacific. In 1704 he published in London a work entitled "An Historical and Geographical Description of Formosa, with Accounts of the Religion, Customs, and Manners of the Inhabitants," by George Palmanazsar. It went into the second edition, but is now very rare.
