Washington, Nov. 16,-The exercises eith which the new school of comparative jurisprudence and diplomacy. of Columbia university, were opened ast night, proved an interesting event, the key note of the occasion being the approval of territorial expansion and harmonious co-operation of the United States and Great Britain in the affairs of the world. The audience included a large representation of the diplomatic corps in Wash-

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who arrived in Washington yesterday, accepted an invitation to take part and all his colleagues on the Canadian-American commission were present. President M. Kinley was also present. Justice Bilewer spoke of the inter-

entional lawyer, trasing his develop-I was as the country expanded the inmand for him was increasing, "I might say," he said. "for the teneut of the distinguished gentlemen present, that expansion is not necessarily confined to the lines of longititde, but works equally as well on the parallels of latitude. There is a country north of us that would make a desirable addition to our territory. and our friend may yet be secretary of state of the United States of Amrica and Canada.

When Sir Wiltrid was introduced a few mi, ates later the welcome he recrived spoke tumultuous volumes for the spirit of appreciation and friendship among Americans for all things English.
