He testified to the condition of the vault and sat. after the robbery was discorered, and identified the unsigned tills found with Pare and Holden as part of the stolen sums. On the night of the robbery there was \$21,160 of current money in the treasury. Besides Ponton and Greene, Messrs. Jones. Barron, Lonesborough and Tucker, former en:ployes, were in possession of the combination of the vault. The cembination on the safe and vault had not been changed for fifteen months prior to the cornery. Mr. Baines told of a record of the combination of the safe, which he had placed on the back of a calendar in his office in the

spring of 1897. The manner in which he discovered the figures was: A discussion about the moon's phases occurred at his house the evening before, and as he recollected that on this calendar in his office the moon's phases were predicted, he turned to the back page to see what was there portrayed, when to his surprise he discovered the figures of the combination of the vault in his own handwriting.

A great deal of the witness' testimony was the same as given at both preliminary examinations, in October, 1897, and August, 1898. C. J.
