POSTAL CURRENCY.

The Canadian government is in advance of the American government in the issue of postal notes. In this country, thanks to Mr. Mulock's progressiveness, to his readmess to act upon a good suggestion, these notes have been out for some time, and have been growing in popularity. The issue has been somewhat limited, it is true has been so far confined to some of the smaller denominations—but the aye em premises to be very complete and to meet the requirements of the people as the money orders never did. These postal notes one may purchase at any time and keep on hand to be filled up, so far as the blanks go, when there is occasion for it.

The Americane propose to go further in the use of these blanks than the Cana diana. It is proposed that they take the p'ace of the money orders, doing away with the advices which involved a cumbroue and expensive rentine. The change means a saving in labour in the money order department, and in other expenses, to the extent of between \$700,000 and \$1,000,000 annually. It is designed that the postal note will become conspicaoue as a commercial currency, that in a negotiable form it will pass from hand to hand, representing a certain par value, until finally filled in and forced into de posits. Even then, it is not to be cashed, but simply exchanged at the post office, and the new crisp note started on its rounds as a circulating medium.

"An et. bargo," says C. W. Post, in the North American Review, "is at present placed on that portion of the country which is represented by small remittances, and it is estimated that the volume of such business must cover one billion dol tare per year, of which the government handles but a small proportion in the way of government postal rates.
