SECURING OF PURE MILK.

THE METHOD HERE EQUAL TO OTHERS.

Questions Answered by the Syracuse Milk Inspectors' Canvas - No Scientific Method of Inspection Made-Safeguaros Around the Source of the Local Milk Employed.

Kingston, Nov. 22, - (To the Edior): In your editorial of the 11th inst., you referred to the question of securing pure milk, and you drew pullic attention to the "scientific method" in which the milk supply of the city of Syracuse is handled, and pointed out that all danger of infection of the milk was averted by its thorough inspection at the market before de-

The picture drawn of how our Yankee friends were able to detect disease germs in milk during the few moments before delivery was so highly colored that I got the impression that perhaps their milk inspector could letect bacteria by the taste or smell, or that by using X rays he was able to classify the milk as rapidly as a; pears from your account.

To ascertain the facts regarding this "scientific method" I submitted to the medical health officer the following list of questions, which were answer ed by F. E. Englehard, milk inspect ar's chemist.

Quest ons 1. Do you license all milk venders! 2. Do you inspect the milk offered

3, If so, state the method! 4. Do you cause a bacteriological ex-

amination of the milk? 5. Do you inspect all cow byres and other premises of milk vendors, and how often each year? 6. State the method of inspection of

byres, dairies, etc.! 7. Do you cause an inspection of the cattle by a veterinary surgeonf 8. Is tuberculin used to test the cat tle in the dairies!

9. Do you inspect the premises of milk vendors who do not reside in your city, but who supply your citizens with milk. Answers 1. All milk vendors are licensed, 2. Milk is inspected on the street

It will be readily seen from the mitted that no "scientific method" of inspection is made to determine whe ther the milk supply is infected or not with disease germs, which can only be discovered by a bacteriological examination; that the examination made is simply to find if the milk has been adulterated with water or some other harmless matter. Therefore the system of inspection in Syrteuse is in no sense superior to the system here. and in my opinion, is quite inferior in at least one very important parti-The inspection made of the dairies

under our by laws covers all the points indo a ed in the answers given. with the additional provision that no that the cattle have been tested with uberculin and are free from tubercu losis. The safeguards which are thrown around the source of the milk supply here ought to reduce the dan ger of infection to the lowest moint. During the inspection of the dairies the following particulars are inquired into and the results noted: Condition of the cattle, any disease in the herd, kind of todder used, bedding used, cattle curried, udders cleaned before milking, cattle let out of byre source of water supply, condition of byre, the ventilation and lighting of the byre, and also the condition of the dairy and the utensils in which the milk is kept. If anything is found objectionable the dairyman is notified

to put it in order. After considering all the facts I do not think it will be necessary to go to Syracuse for pointers, at least not ur til it is made clear that the system there is superior to our ewa. - W. S. GORDON. City Commissioner.
