BAIT PAILS.

Some of them of thirty-two quarts in capacity and rather elaborate. A man who was much interested in such things might suppose that any one of them would do for bait that all you had to do was to get a pail and put in some water and put your bait in; but, as a matter of fact, there are pails designed especially for the carrying of live bait.

The smallest and simplest bait pail, one holding a quart, is of painted tin, with the cover on a hinge and this cover perforated with many holes.

A 99 quart bait pail has inside of it and made of such a size as to fill the pail except for the space required to permit of lifting it out and setting it back easily a tin cylinder with many perforations in it all over, the live fishes for bait being kept in this perforated cylinder or inner pail.

There are smaller pails of various sizes which have removable cylinders in which the live bait can be submerged. Some of these cylinders are intended to be lowered to the bottom. There are some that are made with an air compartment on top so that the perforated cylinder is kept afloat in the water.

BISMARCK'S HUMOR.

QUEER FISH.

The shore fish is so called because it uses its nose to turn over the mud at the bottom of the sea in quest of the worms and small shellfish on which it feeds. Sulfurfish are a genus of fishes remarkable for their elongated and tubular mouths. The only fish species attains a length of five inches. They have no teeth and are esteemed a great delicacy. The ocean contains several fish which clothe and adorn themselves. The most conspicuous of them is the sargassum, a small fish frequenting the Antarganic sea, which literally clothes itself with seaweed. Some fish exhibit great power of endurance when deprived of power of access to their native element. In Holland carp are kept alive for three weeks or a month, the fish being placed in wet moss and kept in a cool spot. The sea cucumber, one of the curious jelly bodies that inhabit the ocean, can practically efface itself when in danger by squeezing the water out of its body and forcing itself into a narrow crack, so narrow as not to be visible to the naked eye.
