The bishop of Ottawa conducted a confirmation service in St. John's church, Perth street, last night. Nineteen candidates—seven males and twelve females—were confirmed. Rev. C. E. Cartwright presiding. Rev. M. Crisp presented the candidates and the bishop administered the charge. Rev. F. W. Hobbs, rector, was in attendance also.

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LAST MEETING OF THE YEAR. BUSINESS TRANSACTED BY THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

A Brain Needed in Victoria Street—both the Medical Health Officer and City Engineer Report to That Effect—Resolution of Thanks to Chairman Phoenix's Reply. The last regular meeting for this year of the board of health was held in the council chamber yesterday afternoon. There were present: chairman Phoenix, mayor Livingston, J. D. Thompson, Dr. Walkem and R. Meek.

The city engineer reported, with reference to the need of a drain in Victoria street. "I strongly recommend the construction of a large storm drain down Victoria and Collingwood streets to the lake, to cut off the western floods which, in times of heavy freshets, overflow the down town sewers, and this overflowing will be increased the more improvements are made in the western area. I consider this drain absolutely necessary." At the same time Mr. Meek had given much thought to the matter of overhauling of the drains, and his investigations were included in the above statement. This year there has been a greater rainfall than in the past two years. The drain built in the lower end of a Collingwood street is better and of a more extensive character than the one used, being laid in Portland cement. This report was allowed to stand for consideration until the next meeting of the board.

Medical health officer Fox submitted his monthly report. In the matter of the petition of W. Bruce and others, referred to him by the board, he reported that he had examined the premises of the petitioners and found, in a number of cases, that their dwellings were in a damp, insanitary condition, caused by the water coming from that part of the city lying west of Victoria street and not being able to escape flooding. The health of the people is endangered and he has recommended, as a sanitary measure, that the drainage be carried to Victoria street to connect with the Collingwood drainage sewer, to be of sufficient capacity to carry off the surface water that causes the flooding.

With reference to the general health of the city the medical health officer reported that for the past month there were reported those numbers of contagious diseases as follows: Typhoid fever, three; scarlet fever, one; diphtheria, none. Dr. Fox thought this an excellent showing for this season of the year. Dr. Walkem was of the same opinion. J. D. Thompson considered that there were too many cases of typhoid fever.

Dr. Fox answered in the negative; the records were comparatively free of disease. Mayor Livingston asked if there was not fear of disease arising from stagnant water lying in the vicinities of Victoria school. Dr. Fox replied that there was not. The water is not stagnant and there could not be any disease arising from it. From the Chairman of streets Wright had proposed to have the post filled in but had neglected doing so. J. D. Thompson thought this matter a serious one. Fifty per cent of the cases of diphtheria reported were from children attending Victoria school. The teachers should be impressed with the importance of preventing a spread of disease once a pupil is attacked. Contagion is responsible for many cases of diphtheria.
