



Postal Improvements GTTAW 1, Dec 9 - The post office department has got a scheme on way for the distribution of mail matter in cities by means of electric railways. Some time ago a special officer of the department was rent to the United States to examine into the patal service in a number of large cities. a Montreal it is understood that the electric railway will be used for distributing letters. Some improvements may also be effected by further utilizing Toronto street railway in the way of distributing. The late fee system will probably be utilized after the next session of parliament, that is by paying an additional amount a letter can be mailed later that the advertised time of closing. By adding an extra stamp a letter can be mailed, say a half hour later than the regular mail closed. Legislation will be necessary for this. At all the railway etations a "late box" will be provided for extra stamped letters, so that five minutes before the train starts the box will be cleared. A system of insurance for letters containing money or valuables will also be adopted. This is a feature in other countries

PARIS, Dec. 9. - The court of execution, the highest judicial tribunal of France has asserted its supremscy over the military power by ordering that the trial by courtmartial of Col. Picquart shall be suspended until after the revision of the Drevius

The trial of Col. Picquart by courtmarrial was ordered by Gen. Zurlinden, military governor of Paris. It was to have taken place December 12th.

This is a victory for Dreyfus who may new hope for justice, as Col. Prequart is the one strong witness in his favor, and he will doubtless be permitted to go on the stand and tell the whole truth concerning the now famous case.
