HARP AND BANJO STRINGS.

The Best and Finest Grades Are

"It has always been believed that violin. harp and banjo strings were made out of the viscera of the cat," explained a teach er of music to a S'ar reporter, "but I have considerable doubt that there ever was a string so made. The gut of a cat is no more suitable for such use than that of a mouse and as far as my investigation goes has never been so used. Violin strings are made of many kinds of skins, but principally out of sheepskins. The secret is in curing the skins, which has always been kept in Italy, where all the finer and better grades of strings are made. There are, however, several concerns in this country which turn out musical strings, and they make a very good grade, though they do not compare as yet with the Ital-

"All the poets who have sung of the musical insides of the cat were wrong. Even Shakespeare, who was phenomenally correct generally in his productions, fell into the prevailing error, probably because he did not take the trouble to look into the matter and accepted the general opinion. The various metallic or wire strings are improving constantly and are used in very large quantities and by the best musicians They have one advantage over the skin strings when used out of doors in that they are not affected by the weather. In damp weather skin or gut strings, as they are generally named, are affected

very much, and, notwithstanding all the tightening, they are very frequently flat in tone. The wire string escapes that in fluence, though there is a certain effect, a timbre, technically speaking, that can be got out of a skin string that no wire string yet made will give you."-Washington

ARE SLEEPING INTO DEATH.

REMARKABLE CASES IN A LON-DON HOSPITAL.

The Disease Is Called The "Heeping Sick. ness," Or "Negro Lethargy"-It Is One Peculiar To The Negro Bace And The West Coast Of Africa - Recovery is Seldom Known - Quration Of The London. Dec. 11.-Among the patients in Charing Cross hospital at the

present time are two negroes who are suffering from what is known as deeping sickness. They have been inmates since September 24th, and the medical authorities and students at tached to the institution have been afforded the opportunity of studying disease unknown in this country, and tween Senegal and Loanda, some 1 500 miles of latitude. Besides being known as the "sleeping sickness," it is sometimes described, because commonly found there, as the "sleeping sickness of the Congo," and some times "negro lethargy.

As the last name implies, the dis ease is practically confined to negroes. and, so far, there have been no authentic cases of rure-bred white men being attacked, though it has been met with in Moors and half breeds, In addition to the peculiar features

of its geographical and racial limitations, the "sleeping sickness" has an other curious phase, which is that it has often been known to lie dormant in the system for a period of seven years, and that, once seized, the pa tient has little or no chance of recov

It is through the instrumentality of Dr. Grattan Guinness that the two patients -- one aged about twenty. with the euphonious name of Eli Mi boko, and the other a boy of eleven or thereabouts, Tonda Mkalco-have been sent to England. The elder, until about fourteen months ago, was remarkable in his village of Mbanza Manteka, on the Lower Congo, as an extraordinary active, self-reliant and intelligent young man. Then he was seized with sickness, and began to be listless and vacant minded, and lost all interest in his termer occupations

no change has become apparent in his condition and now he spends most of his time in a semi comatose condition. rousing only for meals or it spoken to. A feature of his illness is the expression of deep melancholy which marks his features. He is able to give aut and intelligent answers to ques tions, but never speaks an unnecessary wird, and appears to doze almost con-
