## THERE'LL BE A TREATY

Frost stock company at city hall this But Free Lumber Will Not Be In It.

AND MAYBE IT CAN COME UP FOR RATIFICATION

Providing that the Spanish Treaty Mes. sage Can be Got Out of the Way-Cana dians can Have a Clause Making Lam ber \$1, But the senators are Not Strong Enough to Carry Free Trade

Washington, Dec. 19 - Material progress in the negotiations was made at the meeting of the commission on Saturday, and at its close the announcement was made that the conference would resume its work after the Christmas recess, on Toureday, January 5.h. The final meeting before adjournment will be held this morning. The intention of the commissioners

is to pu-h along as rapidly as poseible after they come together again. It is confidently stated that by the end of January, at the furthest, the negotiations will be completed, and that a treaty wil go before the United States senate for ratification by the beginning of February This will leave a clear month for act of before congress opens on March 1 h, an in view of the thur ugh mauner in which the interest of the senators has been aroused, there is every reason to believe that the treaty will be ratified before March 4th.

The Spanish peace treaty will be laid before the senate when it meets January Ith and should be out of the way by the time the British treat; is ready. If, however, the debate on the Spanish treaty is prolonged into an anti-expansion by bt there is serious dauger that the British treaty may go over to the December seaeion of 1593, the feeling against an extra session being so great that there is little probability of one being cailed.

Although not officially admitted it is said that at the meeting of the commiseion on Saturday the announcement was made that the necessary two thirds major ity of the senate could not be obtained for the free admission of Canadian lumber, and that a treaty with such a provision in it would be foredcomed to failure. Were it a question of a majority vote free lumber could safely be included, but the treaty as a whole must get the support of eixty one senators, and the lumber inter est has, it is asserted, proved stronger in this respect than the administration.
