# PAINTING AFRICA RED.

How Major Macdonald Is Planting the

LONDON, Dec 20 - News has come via at the head of the British expedition explotting British East Africa. The major writes that he has established stations all the way northward from Uganda to lake Rudolph. He is now about to descend the river Sobat, which empties into the Nile, south of Fashoda, and proceed to Fachoda. The expedition has effected a great stroke in the way of establishing British claims to the enormous territory lying south of the Abyseinia and between the Upper Nile and the east coast. In addition to his territorial conquest the Macdonald expedition will form an important link in the great chain of British posts now being established from the Cape to Cairo.

Macdenald started in from Mombasa, north of Zanzibar, in July, 1897, and proceeded in a north-westerly direction, ostensibly merely to explore the lake Rudolph region and Sommliland generally. That Fachoda was to be his ultimate destination and territorial conquest his object, were carefully concealed at the time. Nevertheless, he had with him 600 picked Sawhlie, fifty Sikhe, a Maxim battery, and a large train of bearers and followers. As soon as the expedition, sent by Cecil Rhodes building telegraph lines and cetablishing poats from the Cape northward, reaches the great lakes of Central Africa, it will be easy to connect with Macdonald's posts at lake Rudolph and thus complete the line from the Cape to Cairo.

A Peace Offering. MIDDLETON'S, Conn., Dec. 20 - It is etated on the authority of a member of the committee appointed to make an investi gation of the so called Jernegan process of extracting gold from sea water, that Rev. P. F. Jernegan, formerly of this city, who is now in Bruesele, has sent to the directors of the Entrolyric marine sait company \$75 000 in cash as a sort of peace offering preliminary to his return to the United States with his family. Jernegan converted all his stock and securi ties into cash previous to going abroad and it is nearly one third of the proceed that he has returned of his own free wil and without promises or inducements of any kind.
