ILOILO IS SOLELY BESET.

Nightly Fighting Occurs—Aid From United States is Sought

MANILA, P.I., Dec. 19.—The Spanish steamer Brutus has arrived here from Iloilo with 315 native soldiers and seven priests on board.

They are surrounded by superior forces of insurgents, who are estimated to number 225,000 men. Against them the Spaniards have only 2,500 men.

CREDITORS SEEK THE THOUSAND ISLAND PARK MAN.

Escaped Service of Papers—Order in Supplementary Proceedings Granted—Lowville Man Started The Ball A-Rolling—Defendant in His Florida Orange Grove.

An order was granted by justice Frank H. Hooper on December 18th, requiring that Melvin D. Kinney, of Thousand Island Park fame, appear before a referee and submit to an examination in supplementary proceedings.

During the past six or eight weeks the courts have been crowded with frequent intervals in the Kinney matter, and as things now stand it looks as though Kinney was on the top shelf with a good show of staying there for a while at least.

On November 25th, a judgment creditor in the sum of \$2,700, started the crusade against Mr. Kinney November 19th, when a motion was made before justice Scripture to issue an order for his arrest.

On November 25th, between the beginning and the termination of this proceeding, that James E. Coit, of Watertown, a brother in law of Kinney, began an action against Kinney for large sums of money claimed to have been loaned.

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EXPLOSION IN A CHURCH.

PART OF THE WALL WAS BLOWN OUT.
