ILOILO IS SORELY BESET.

Nightly Fighting Occurs—Aid From United States Is Sought
MANILA, P.I., Dec. 19.—The Spanish steamer Brutus has arrived here from Iloilo with 315 native soldiers and seven priests on board.

She reports that fighting occurs at Iloilo

nightly and that the merchants there are

suspicious awaiting the arrival of the Americans to relieve the situation. The streets of Iloilo are almost deserted.

The Spanish officers admit that it is

impossible for them to maintain their

position at Iloilo unless they are speedily

reinforced.

They are surrounded by superior forces

of insurgents, who are estimated to num-

ber 22,000 men. Against them the Spaniards have only 2,500 rifles.

The authorities here have allowed 127

soldiers from the steamer Union to land

upon proving former residence on the is-

land of Luzon. The landing of others

from the same steamer is still undecided

upon.
