Perhaps there has not been the finest discrimination as to what should be given of trials, and what should be suppressed, but the press becomes more and more careful and is exercising a reasonable intelligence in what it reproduces. The point has not been reached, of course, where the average editor adopts the ideals of Edward Norman, of "In His Steps," and all of it; yet the refining influences of the times are manifested nowhere, in no direction, more than in the Canadian jour-


