



DEATH OF CAPT. SAUNDERS. He Fell Into The Hold Of A Vessel-Sketch Of His Career.

Cape Vincent Fagle. 10 is with regret we announce the death of Capt. Richard Saunders, at Wate-town, Tue day morning. The cause of his doubt was from a fall he received on the steambarge Coaster about one week ago. The captain was walking about on the deck and accidentally fell into the hold of the boat, falling a distance of about six feet, striking upon his head and shoulders. Although somewhat bruised by the fall, he was able to leave for his home at Waterbown the next morning and was supposed to be recovering from the effects of the accident, when news of his death was re-

Capt. Saunders was born in Sustex county, England, October 22ad, 1839, the son of George and Cordelia Saunders. He came to this country with his parents, when eighteen months old. Until four years ago he had made his residence in this village. Since the age of twenty-one years his occupation had been that of a eailor. For twenty-six years he was captain of the sailing craft L S. Hammond, and was thoroughly acquainted with the waters of the So. Lawrence river and great lakes. For the past two or three seasons he had assisted his brother, Capt. Joseph Saunders, in the mauagement of the

No man in Cape Vincent was more popular or held in higher esteem than Capt. "Dick," as he was generally known. His character was above reproach and his word was as good as his note. He was a kind and sympathetic friend and neighbor, a faithful and loving bueband and father. Besides his wife and daughter, Mrs. U. S. Miller, he is survived by three brothers, Joseph, George and Charles Saunders, and one sister, Mrs. William Humphrey, of Cape Vincent.

The Election Stands. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Dec 23 - In the contested election case of O. H. Brigham against P. C. Stanford, the court lays down the rule that alien-born women be come naturalized when they marry citi zons of the state. The appellant was elected a member of a board of education in L'vingston county, and his election was contested on the ground that a number of alien women, the wives of citizens, had been permitted to vote at the election. The court declared that the marriage of an alien born woman to a citizen is sufficiont to make her a citizen, and that she may vote under the same laws that other women vote.

German Expansion.

London, Dec. 23. - Advices from the Congo state that the steamship Edward Bohlen, of Hamburg, has arrived with the German governor of Cameroons, Herr Von Puttkamer, on board. The governor is accompanied by four German officers and about 100 native troops, and is bound for the Sangha district. The object of the expedition is said to be the opening up of that country and establishing commercial relations with the natives. Bacon Dhanes is rumored to have been silled by a native's spear, and Capt. Dalafone, leader of the French expedition, is said to have committed suicide.
