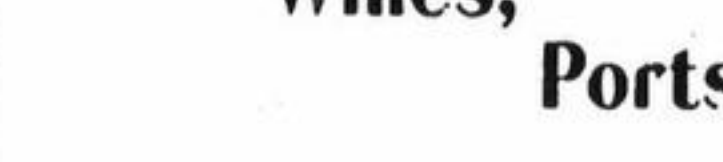

CARLOS MUST MOVE SOON

OR HE WILL BE FOREVER TOO LATE.

Don Carlos, if Count Kinkowstrow ever made the statement attributed to him...

LONDON, Dec. 28.—The Morning Post publishes to-day a communication from a correspondent now travelling in Spain...

The recent arrest at Leon of Don Carlos, editor of the Carlist newspaper, El Correo Espanol, is the chief of the panic which has seized the authorities.

Don Carlos was visiting the district, where he was arrested, for family reasons, and without the slightest idea of stirring up revolution.

His imprisonment is likely to do the government much more harm than good.

The results of our enquiries tend to show that the Spanish republicans have some sympathy with Don Carlos.

They would not fight for him, but they would not welcome any means of overthrowing the present corrupt regime.

Still it is useless for Don Carlos to imagine that he can do anything without fighting, and he must make a move soon or not at all.

The Times editorially repudiates this morning the notion that Don Carlos will get any support from England.

ILOILO SURRENDERS.

Gen. Rios Telegrams to That Effect—His Despatch Ambiguous.

MADRID, Dec. 28.—Gen. Rios, the Spanish commander in the Visayas islands, has telegraphed to the government from Iloilo, capital of the island of Panay, under date of December 24th as follows:

"I am preparing to embark on the steamer Lao XIII for Zamboanga, island of Mindanao, having yesterday (December 23rd) formally surrendered Iloilo, in the presence of the military and naval commanders.

The mayor and the foreign consuls have charged the German consul with the protection of Spanish interests. Shall arrive at Manila by the end of this month."

Though the despatch is ambiguous it is assumed here that the surrender of Iloilo was to the Americans.

ZURLINDEN FEARS NO PLOT.

French Army Too Patriotic To Rise Against The Government.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—The Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphs his paper the substance of an interview he has had with Gen. Zurlinden who denied the existence of any military conspiracy against the republic.

According to the correspondent, Gen. Zurlinden said: "I believe there is no such thing as a plot against the republic. The army is republican to the core. A republic is not a dictatorship. The name Napoleon may be music to our ears, but we are the nation's servants and our duty is to France."

"The army like the majority of the nation, believes in Dreyfus' guilt, but a declaration of his innocence would not induce the army to turn against the republic."

Should Have Lottier Aspirations.

VIENNA, Dec. 28.—Two men and a woman, the latter eighteen years old, began the ascent of the Rax, one of the Semmering mountains, last Sunday.

When they sought shelter in a hut at a height of 14,000 metres, the woman was accouched of a son. The mother was intensely cold.

The men built a fire and one of them ascended the mountain and induced a physician to visit the woman. A heavy snow storm is threatened, and it is probable that the party on the mountain will be imprisoned for a long time.

The College Closed.

PARIS, Dec. 28.—The medieval university at Azay Le Rideau, in the province of Poitou, which was designed to bring French and English youths together for mutual improvement and a better understanding of each other's ways, has been closed, owing to the criticisms of the jingo local press and the fact that the priests raised a row about the "contaminating influence of English thought and manners."

Their Generosity Unrewarded.

PARIS, Dec. 28.—Thirty officers have been arrested and all sentenced to four days' imprisonment for subscribing to funds started by Liberte Parole to enable Mme. Parole to meet the expenses of her contemplated prosecution of M. Joseph Riwariach, editor of Republique Francaise and conservative deputy of the district of Digne, for declaring that her husband, Lieut.-Col. Henry, was a traitor.

A New Chemical Substance.

PARIS, Dec. 28.—It is stated that Dr. Becquerel has announced to the academy of science the discovery of a new chemical substance which has a close affinity to barium. Its discoverer, MM. Currie and Brémou, have named it radium. It is so sensitive to light that it will take photographic impressions.

To Wait Instructions.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Felipe Agoncillo, personal representative of Aguinaldo, leader of the Philippine patriots, has left the city for Washington, accompanied by his interpreter, S. Lucez. In Washington Agoncillo will await the arrival of eminent Filipinos who are en route with additional instructions from Aguinaldo.

Offered The Place.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—President McKinley has offered to archbishop Ireland the honor of serving as the American representative to the czar's peace conference, and the archbishop has replied that he will gladly accept, providing he can get the pope's consent.

The Insurgents Victorious.

MADRID, Dec. 28.—The insurgents under Lopez practically completed the conquest of the Philippines on Monday. They occupied Iloilo on that day before the arrival of the American expedition, the Spaniards having evacuated the city and gone to Zamboanga.
