> MOVE HOUSE BY USE OF SOAP Saved Five-Storey Stulldings Condemned In New York.

New York, Dec. 29.- What the contractors assert is one of the most important feats in house moving in this vicinity has just been performed on the north side of the Barlem river, Four five storey brick houses were FIRST-CLASS FARE and ONE-THIRD, good moved Ho teet by means of soaped ways and jackscrews, and are soon to be occupied by tenants. corner of 134th street and Willis avenue. The Will's avenue bridge calls for the widening of the avenue forty feet on each side. The five houses were in the way, and lorty feet of their sev enty feet depth was condemned. It was thought that the buildings would have to come down, but, as

they cost \$61,000 to erect, an architect said he believed they could be saved by moving them. He was the on y man for a time who would place any faith in the undertaking. But he and a house moving contractor got to work, and were about to begin when the building department put a stop to the moving. The supreme court was appealed to, and judge Pryor upheld the architect. It was decided to leave thirty feet

of the corner house standing. The houses were then separated from Single First Class Fare and One-Third, going their foundations and 315 jackscrews were placed underneath them. Then the entire row of houses was raised four feet. They stood the strain without injury, and ways were quick ly placed under them. The ways were each twelve inches square, and thirty boxes of hard soap and twelve barrels of soft soap were used in making them slippery enough to slide the houses on. The houses were then let down on the ways, the Jackscrews being removed.

The strain of the jackscrews was then placed laterally, and the houses were pushed along the sligtery ways for forty feet east, and the ways be ing changed, seventy five feet south. The houses weighed 3,500 tons,
