



BUILT ON THE PLANS OF JULES VERNE'S NAUTILUS.

It Is to Be a Pleasure Craft and Will Dive and Rise Like a Fish-May Be Converted Into a Torpedo Boat on Short

The Nautilus, that fascinating craft of fiction in which Jules Verne took his cruise of "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the fea," is to be realized. A submarine boat is now being constructed in Philadelphia which will duplicate nearly all the features which Verne's imagination supplied -sliding panels, plate glass doors, exits markable Remedy-Home Testimony | leading out into the dim, mysterious wa-

Heretofore all attempts to make submarine boats have been in the interests of the navy. They have all been torpedo carriers, mere engines of destruction. This one, however, is to be built chiefly as a pleasuro yacht, although it is intended to use her principally for scientific purposes. She submarine monster of the deep, for it is

H. E. DANTZBECHER, yacht designer of Philadelphia who of late years has won an enviable reputation for skill in shipbuilding. He is no mere theorist, and he is not looking for funds with which to experiment, for a wealthy Philadelphian has already ordered a sub marine boat built from his plans and has furnished the \$41,000 which, it is estimated, will be required.

There are to be many novel features about the new boat. In the first place, she will accommodate a crew of 10 persons comfortably, and they will be able to live for 12 hours beneath the surface without rising to the top for a supply of fresh air. Rising only twice in 24 hours, the yacht will be able to travel for 18 days at full speed and cover from 4,500 to 5,000 miles by using only 66 per cent of her power.

The craft will be a cigar shaped cylinder 100 feet long and about 12 feet in diameter at the midship section. The sides are t be constructed of mild steel varying in thickness from three-eighths of an inch at the ends to half an inch in the other parts. In one side and in the bottom a large sec: tion of this steel plating will be so constructed that it can be slid back, uncurtaining, so to speak, large windows of

thick and perfectly clear plate glass. Thus may the yacht be made into a submarine observatory at will, for by the aid of powerful electric searchlights the depths of the sea can be illuminated and the passengers and crew may view the wonders of the ocean's bed spread out before them. The wealthy owner intends to invite small parties of scientists to accompany him on his submarine trips and thus add a great deal to the general store

of knowledge. In the bow of the boat are to be constructed two elliptical openings fitted with air chambers. Through these persons clad in diving suits may walk out when the boat is resting on the bottom of the ocean. Should it be desired to turn the yacht into a torpedo boat these doors could be supplanted with torpedo tubes. This would indeed make the craft a submarine monster. Creeping swiftly and unseen through the depths below the warship of an enemy blow could be dealt which would result in instant destruction. Then, as the huge floating fort settled down into the water, the commander of the submarine boat, throwing open his observation window, could back off a safe distance and leisurely

watch the destruction which he had caused. The diving apparatus of the boat is rad ically different from that of any other sub marine boat yet constructed. The principle by which the fish sustains himself in the water and darts up or dives down has. been copied. On either side of the boat are to be two lateral rudders or diving planes corresponding to the lateral fins, of the fish. These are to be regulated by a shaft running through the boat and by a set of levers which may be operated by the helmsman. When the levers are not to keep the boat on a level keel, but when they are depressed or elevated the boat shoots up or down just as required.


Should the machinery by an accident become disarranged a reserve buoyancy of from 700 to 1,000 pounds, which is to be always maintained, will allow the craft to rise at once to the surface. The air supply is to be drawn from tanks, and after it has been used it will be exhausted b means of blowers and pumps to another tompartment, whence it is forced out into

Motor power for driving the boat forward will be furnished by gas engines, the gas being made from gasoline and exploded by sparks from a storage battery. The engines will exhaust into the open air when on the surface, but when under water the gases will be discharged outboard by a vacuum pump. There will be two engines, and one can be disconnected from the driving shaft and be used to furnish power for the air compressor. If desired

He was admitted to the bar in 1857 and, in spite of many interruptions, has practiced his pro-He began his political career at an early age. He was only 25 when he took an ac-

tive part in the first Lincoln campaign, being one of the delegates to the Republican national convention in 1860. He also went on the stump for Lincoln. He was attorney for the southern district of New York, but during the second year of the war resigned this position to enlist in the Union army. He went in as captain and soon became lieutenant colonel of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh New York volunteers. He was appointed judge advocate general of the department of the south, provost marshal general and chief of staff of General Gillmore in quick succession. He was promoted to the rank of colonel for brayery in action and brevetted brigadier general. He was also military governor of Charleston and Savannah. I. 1865 he resigned his commission and returned to New York, where he resumed the practice of law. At the same time he became prominent in politics once more. In 1866 he was elected lieutenant governor of New York state. Two years later he declined a nomination for congress, and in 1870 was candidate for governor, but was defeated. He was delegate to the national Republican convention 1872 and four years later was himself a candidate for the vice presidential nomination. He received 66 votes, but withdrew after several ballots. In 1877 he was appointed United States district attorney for the southern district of New York. He was reappointed to the same office by President Garfield.

In 1882 General Woodford refused to support Judge Folger for governor of New York and for a time was not in harmony with his party, but returned to the fold. He and Senator Platt are old friends, and the latter is said to have made an attempt to get him a place in the McKinley cab-


