BIG FRAUD IN BOOZE.

Large Illicit Still Seized By Revenue Officers In Quebec.

OTTAWA, July 9. The deputy minister of inland revenue, Mr. Miall, has received a telegram from Quebec, stating that an illicit still was seized there. It is the biggest seizure of the kind reported for many years. The still has a fermenting capacity of 5,000 gallons. This means that it was capable of turning out daily a quantity of liquor which, if it had to pay excise, would amount to about \$600

London, July 9. - Graeco-Turkish affairs stage. Yesterday the porte despatched a circular to its representatives abroad containing a skilful defence of Turkey's case and declining to consider any frontier line in Thessaly north of the river Peneious, which it regards as the natural boundary. It appears that the sultan has convinced himself that the powers will not resort to coercion, and has decided to test the alleged concert of Europe to the utmost.
