the Late Senator Harris. Thomas B. Turley, the new senator from Tennessee, who has been appointed to succeed the late Isham G. Harris, is a lawyer prominent in Memphis, but this is the first office of any kind which he has ever held. His political career, in fact, is less than a year old. Last summer Bourke Cockran went to Memphis and made an address in support of the gold standard. Mr. Turley replied with a free silver argument which at once made his reputation as a political speaker and gained him high favor with the dominant party in the state.

Mr. Turley is a native of Memphis and

is 52 years old, although he looks much

younger. He is about 5 feet 8 inches in

a dark complexion, with iron gray hair. When the war broke out, Mr. Turley was schoolboy, but he enlisted in 1861 with the Maynard rifles, Company L, One Hundred and Forty-fifth Tennessee regiment of the Confederate army. He was twice wounded, once at Shiloh and again at Peach Tree Creek, in front of Atlanta. He was captured in the battle of Nashville and taken to Camp Chase, Ohio, where he was held prisoner until March, 1865, when he was exchanged and returned After the war Mr. Turley entered the

University of Virginia, where he studied law for two years. In 1869 he was admitted to the bar, and since then has been practicing his profession in Memphis. At present he is a member of the firm of Turley & Wright. In 1870 Mr. Turley was married to Miss. Irene Rayner, and they have five children, all of whom are living. In a recent interview Mr. Turley said that as far as the tariff was concerned he was as near a free trader as he could consistently be, advocating a tariff for revenue only. On the financial question his views are strictly in line with the sentiments of the Chicago platform.

THE OMAHA EXPOSITION.

Transmississippi States Active In Pushing the Enterprise.

The Transmississippi and International exposition, which is to be held at Omaha between June 1 and Nov. 1, 1898, is gradually growing in completeness. That it will be a national event is already an assured fact. Congress has appropriated \$300,000 for a government department and exhibit, and many of the states west of the Mississippi have generously contributed. The rest will undoubtedly make appropriations in good time, so that all will be represented when the time comes to open

the big gates. The purpose of the exhibition is to show to the rest of the world the products, industry, resources and civilization of the states and territories west of the Mississippi, which embrace two-thirds of the area, one-third of the population and onehalf the total wealth of the country. The enterprise is being managed by a corporation organized under the laws of Nebraska, with a capital stock of \$1,000,000. There is a board of 50 directors, and each state and territory interested in the exposition is represented in the management by a vice president. The citizens of Omaha alone have subscribed \$400,000 of the capi


