

LOOKS BAD FOR THE HIRED BOY.

Suspicion In The Galt Murder Case Is Nar-

rowing Down. GALT, Ont., August 19 -The result of the crown's investigations into the murder of Mrs. Orr is to fasten the guilt more or less surely on the hired boy, Allison, now in jail. It has been said that he is too young to be able to do the deed. He is in reality a short, but very heavily built boy of seventeen, with beetle brow, heavy jaw, an ugly mouth and small narrow eyes. He has a pair of shoulders on him which show him quite capable of handling a woman of 130 pounds like Mrs. Orr. The certainty that the crime was committed by some one living on the premises, and the practical assurance of the husband's innocence, as well as the boy's suspicious utterances since the affair, are the chief grounds of guilt. Inspector Murray's fivehour interview with him did not tend to his welfare.

The theory is that, being left alone with Mrs. Orr on the morning of the crime, he quarrelled with her after she took the milk into the shed, and struck her with his gun or with a piece of wood, killing her perhaps accidentally. He hurriedly buried her near at hand, and afterwards made, preparations to remove the body to the swamp, which were frustrated by the searching parties. Allison was not allowed to testify at the inquest.

The most startling evidence at the inquest was Anthony Orr's statement of how he shadowed Allison and overheard him talking to himself down in the field, and exclaiming: "Oh, my! Oh, my!" as though in great mental agony. The crown's theory is that he dug the grave in the swamp on Tuesday morning, when he went for the cows, and came back half an hour after the cattle arrived at the barn. It is thought that he hid the spade in the swamp the day before. Premising that Allison killed Mrs. Orr, it is still a question whether he committed the deed before or after going to Barrie's with the cow. It is all a question of time, and George Barrie's evidence at the inquest to-day will be very important, showing when Allison arrived at his place, how long he stayed, his demeanor, and when he left. The crown authorities seem to favor the theory that he killed the


