

The main theory of the paper read was that fuel supply of the world is as great as the air supply. The fuel being equal to the amount of oxygen that consumes it. He estimates that there is still available in Great Britain alone one tons of coal which at the present rate consumption would last 150 years. The supply of fuel for Great Britain appeared to be above the ordinary, but he thought it might safely be stated that the world's supply was two thousand times that of Great Britain. Lord Kelvin dwelt also on the enormous increase in the use of water power, which would lessen the amount of oxygen required in the burning of fuel and yet render possible enormous industrial


