Over Division Of Booty Captured From Forts.

IF AFRIDIS ARE NOT IMMEDIATE-LY PUNISHED.

Telegraph Wires on Bolan Route to Quetta Again Cut-Will force the Kohat Pass If Necessary-Much Individual Firing-Fighting Centred Along Samana Rauge -Disinclined to Join Rebellion-General Lord Roberts Will Proceed to India in Case of a Contingency.

Bombay, August 30,-Little fresh news has been received here from the frontier. An attack has been made on Shimwari, in the Samana range, but the attacking force was repulsed, losing five killed and many wounded. There is a considerable excitement among the tribes along the Bolan route to Quetta and the telegraph wires have been again cut. It is reported that Sanitarium, and much anxiety is felt regarding the safety of ladies and children there, as the railway officials are asking for military protection for their property. If the route is considered safe, the ladies and children at the sanitarium will be brought away, but otherwise troops will be sent from Quetta to protect them.

The column under Col. Gordon, which was dispatched to the Samana district yesterday, is composed entirely of native troops, and is fully equipped with medical commissariat and transport service. I has orders to force the Kohat Pass if neces Rumors are current tending to throw

doubte upon the genuineness of the Ameer's reply to the viceroy of India regarding the complicity of Afghan subjects in the up rising. The disarming of the Khyber rifles, which formed a part of the garrison of Jamrud, was a complete surprise, but the orders were obeyed without trouble. Much individual firing into the camp at Jamrud has taken place, as many as 100 stray shots having been fired at the outposts in a single night. Some of these shots were fired at so short a range that three native officers who were on watch were killed. It speaks well for the discipline and obedience maintained in the camp that not a single shot was fired in reply. The hot weather is extremely trying, but the health and spirits of the troops are good. Fears are expressed of the fall of Rustam, north-west of Mardan, the whole district being in the hands of the enemy. General Wodehouse has gone from Mardan to Hustam, where the force, which now numbers 2,000 men with two

guns, will be strengthened. The fighting now seems to be centred along the Samana range and this tends to prove that a general uprising of the Orakzais has taken place. It is probable that some of the small outposts will prove untenable, but it is believed that for this Gulistan and Lockhart are quite strong enough to resist the attack of the enemy

London, August 30.—Confirmation has been received of the rumor that the Afridis are quarrelling among themselves over the division of the booty taken from the captured forts. Only about 500 of them have been left to guard the Khyber pass, the others having dispersed to seek supplies of provisions. This is probably the reason for the cessation of hostilities.

The general idea here is that if further delay occurs in punishing the Afridis, for which purpose at least 20,000 men are re quired, there will be a great uprising on an enormous scale, extending from Erakzailand to Zaimukht, beyond Kuram, and into Waziristan, despite the presence of the British field forces in the Tochi Val-

RAILROAD PROBLEM SOLVED.

To Communicate by Telegraph With Moving Train.

CHICAGO, August 30.—The most difficult problem of railroad operation-how to communicate by telegraph with a moving train anywhere on the line-has been solved by a young Chicago inventor. George V. Trott, a former telegraph operator, has devised a system which shortly be put in operation on the Penn-sylvania railroad, by which every train on the line will be in communication with the station next ahead, and, when desired with the train despatcher or any public telegraph station.
