One of the principal and most interest ing features of the closing week of the fair, apart from the events of the exhibition. was the trades procession on labor day. This was an unusually sight and would have furnished useful object lesson to legal philosophers and so called socialists, who seek to ameliorate the condition of the laboring classes by high sounding platitudes and disquisitions on antediluvian events. The Toronto workmen, by their procession, showed that they have recognized the broad fact that in union there is strength, and that actions, not empty words, will produce wished for results in any sphere. The members of each trade organization, headed by a band, and wearing the dress peculiar to their calling, marched in a body; in many cases huge trucks, bearing workmen engaged in the everyday occupation of the members of special organizations, preceded the unions. Thus the bricklayers marched in rear of a wegon on which were men building a brick wall; the blacksmiths behind a forge with workmen busily turning out horse shoes, etc. The route of the procession was lined by thousands of spectators, and the turnout was one that would do credit to any city and to any trades or-
