THE GATE TO INDIA.

HISTORIC KHYBER PASS.

The Serious Situation That Confronts John Bull In His Eastern Empire-The Rebellious Tribes and Their Warlike Habits Prospects of a Holy War.

Khyber pass, which is now held by the rebellious tribes of northern India, is the great northwestern gateway to England Asiatic province. It connects India with Afghanistan, that turbulent country which both Russia and England would like to hold, but which neither one dares

The pass itself is a narrow defile through the heart of the mountains. It is about 30 miles long and of varying width, running between precipitous walls from 600 to 1,000 feet high. Through this defile runs a river, and along its banks is the only military road between western Asia and the Indian peninsula. To the southeast of the pass lies Peshawar, an English stronghold which has been made the base of the British military force. Back from the western end of the pass lies Kabul, the eapital of Afghanistan. The British end of the pass is guarded by forts. The most important of these has been stormed and taken by the hill tribes, and other garrisons along the pass are expected to give in if not soon relieved.

The most active of the rebels are the Afridis, who are the most powerful of all the border tribes. Their armed strength is about 27,000 men. They are flerce, athletic mountaineers who are tough customers on any ordinary occasion, and when, as at present, their natural ferocity is increased by religious fanaticism they are like so many demons.

Up to the present time the Afridis have been loyal to the English, for some reason or other. Probably it was because they liked to fight in uniform and appreciated the fine weapons with which they were equipped. Perhaps they concluded that it would be better to let the English find exouses to keep them busy fighting rather than depend upon intertribal difficulties for their amusement.

And right here it may be as well to call attention to the fact that the fighting which is being done now up among the Chitral hills is no mere skirmishing such as has been going on in Cuba for many months. The greatest battles which Wey A Exchange Chambers, Offord's Block, 81

thing that happens there you may be sure it is of some moment. A little battle which occurred the other day out there resulted in the killing of 2,700 tribesmen, while the English loss is given as 50 men

and 2 officers. And it is not gentlemanly fighting either. The tribesmen pay no attention to martial etiquette. They have no time to bother with prisoners. White glaours or native troops are shown no distinction, but are mercilessly put to the sword. The English have to adopt the same methods. There are seldom any wounded. The survivors are either well enough to answer roll call or else they are irretrievably deceased. As Kipling sings it:

When you're wounded and lie on Afghanistan's plains And the women come out to cut up your re-

Jast roll to your rifle and blow out your

And go to your God like a soldier. Tommy Atkins fully understands this by the time he has served in northern India many weeks, and he acts accordingly, showing no mercy. It is hard for us to understand what bloodthirsty beings these tribesmen are. For centuries they have lived in these wild mountain fastnesses, following robbery and brigandage as a business and indulging in homicide as a pastime. When other excitement fails, they make war on each other just to keep

their hands in. Before the English came they depended on swords, spears and antiquated muskets, but their white rulers have taught them to use martinis. Their weapons are now of the best, for what they could not afford to buy they stole, even if they had to chop a sepoy in two to do it. These are the men who have risen against English rule. Back of them are the priests; back of the priests thas amiable and cheerful cut throat, the ameer of Afghanistan, and back of the ameer—well, the English say

the ezar is back of him. This, however, leads up to an exploration of that complex puzzle, the eastern question, which has brought gray hairs to generations of European diplomats and in whose mazes the ordinary American might wander for months without getting anywhere. It is definitely known, however, that Russian ozars for a century back have cherished the ambition of some day marching through the Khyber pass into India.

As for the ameer, he is playing his cards very close. His Paythans caught the Eng-Msh in a trap ence, and Khyber pass ran red with the blood of 16,500 British fighting men, but the English paid him back, taking life for life, and a few for interest. So be does not want to see the redceats marching on his capital again. It does please him mightily, however, to see the hill tribes gathering, leaving the British ranks and firing from ambush on the col-

ors which they have so often defended. England's situation would not be so serious were the Afridis the only rebels. but they are not. Other tribes, just as warlike and some even more valorous, are rising to the summons of a jehad, or holy war, which it has been rumored has been proclaimed. If the jehad is really on, the British flag may never wave again at the entrance to the Khyber. Among the 200, -000,000 Asiatic subjects of "the widow a Windsor" 50,000,000 are Mohammedans, and England knows what it is to have her native troops, who are largely followers of the prophet, turn their arms against their officers. She has not forgotten that bloody page in her history whose title is Lucknow.


